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Use of Fish in Malaria Control
In malaria control, as well as in operations against yellow fever, fish are now playing a most important role.

"In the Southern States fish are being extensively used to control the breeding of the malaria-mosquito. In practically all the towns in which there have been demonstrations of malaria control by anti-mosquito measures during 1920 and 1921 they have been an important auxiliary to drainage and oiling and in many instances the chief or even sole reliance."

"In a group of five counties in the state of Alabama practically every farmer has convenient access to a minnow hatchery from which he is able to stock breeding places with fish as occasion arises. The city of Richmond, Va. has stocked all its big fountains, reservoirs, and lakes with minnows, and has established hatcheries to furnish the fish free of charge to any communities in the state that wants them."

Malaria Survey in Missouri
From August to December, 1921, Doctor Mark P. Bold of the Board of Health staff, in service with the M. State Board of Health, conducted a malaria survey in the southeastern corner of that state. Although the territory studied lies on the northern border of the recognized malaria zone of the United States, Doctor Bold found that malaria is responsible for nearly 60 per cent of all illnesses. "Of the people having attacks of malaria about 30 per cent consult a physician; about 16 per cent have no treatment; and the remainder dose themselves with chili tonics and quinine. None were found who had received what is regarded as the minimal dosage of quinine necessary to make a cure reasonably certain." The people living in open, un-screened dwellings. seems to be mainly responsible for the fact the highest infection rate was found among farm-hands, 14.6 per cent; a lower rate among tenants 10.2 per cent; and the lowest among proprietors, 7.3 per cent.

"The outstanding fact is that malaria in this region is on the decline; and that the principal cause of the decline is systematic agriculture drainage. Doctor Boyd's conclusion is that the key to the control of the residual malaria lies in improving housing conditions to provide better protection against mosquitoes and educating the doctors and the people in proper standards of malaria treatment and the important of effecting a cure."

smaller number that know of the legend which connects this section of the State with that title. This story dates back to the days of the visit of Cornwallis and the British army to this section, when the present river known to us as the Tar river was called the Pamlico river because that was the name the Indians gave it, it was then, if the story be true, that residents of this State earned the name of the "Tar Heels." It is a fact of State history that in early colonial days the chief industry lay along the banks of the streams that coursed into the main land, and that industry was the gathering of tar, pitch and turpentine from the pine trees. When a sufficient quantity had been procured a log raft was built and it was sent down stream to Pamlico and Albemarle sounds and there met by a sail boat and when reloaded was taken to England the mother country and to other ports. When Cornwallis' army came into the Carolinas in his effort to conquer the Tories and Rebels he encountered vast stores of these products along the banks of the rivers, for exports had been cut off.

CANVASS OF SPECIAL ELECTION HELD IN THE TOWN OF PINETOPS, N. C., NOVEMBER 23, 1920

The canvass of the returns of the Special election, duly called and held at the regular polling place in the Town of Pinetops on the 23rd day of November, 1920, for the purpose of determining whether or not the town of Pinetops should issue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$25,000.00 for the purpose of establishing an electric light and power system in and for said Town, the Bond Ordinance having been heretofore duly passed and the election regularly called, as provided in the Municipal Finance Act:

Now Therefore, we, the Board of Commissioners of said Town of Pinetops, at this the first regular meeting of said Board since said Election, have canvassed the returns of said Election and do find:

1. That there were 34 votes cast in favor of said Bond Ordinance.
2. That there were 8 votes cast against said Bond Ordinance.
3. That there were 58 voters registered and qualified to vote in said Election.

Therefore, we do declare and enact that said Bond Ordinance was duly approved by the voters and carried in said Election as required by law, and certify the same to be recorded in the Record of Ordinances of said Town, together with this canvass of the returns of said Election.
