METHODIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY TO HOLD MEET

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—The general executive meeting of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of Methodist Episcopal church will be held at Baltimore, Md., Oct. 24-31, it was announced today by Mrs. Evelyn Riley Nicholson, Chicago, president of the society. Mrs. Nicholson is the wife of Bishop Thomas Nicholson, resident bishop of Chicago.

The general executive is a representative body consisting of officers and delegates from all parts of the United States and missionaries from nineteen foreign countries in which the society works.

There are 617,553 members, and of this number 453,514 are women and 154,254 are children. In the maintenance of its work the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society last year spent \$2,500,000.
