Elementary schools will be conducted at these places and all high school pupils will be transported to Dixie for instruction at present, at later on to a new central high school that will be erected during the present year near the Calhoun place, a mile east of Rocky Mount.

The committeemen for the district are J. A. Banks, J. M. Pierce, G. J. Stallions, Dixie district; W. H. Kilbrow, Frank Colman, B. W. Brown, Nobles Mill district; J. A. Oung, G. W. Bradley, W. V. Beck, Oak Dale district; W. A. Peafor, Paul Taylor, T. P. D. Juvenile district; R. T. Tolson, Dukey Hill, Joseph Moore, Powell district; C. D. Wamble, Terperance Hall district; S. B. Douglas, J. I. Lanester, Lanester district.

Most of the districts were represented in the meeting Thursday evening. The object of the meeting was to lay plans for the opening of a school in the district. It was unanimously voted that the school open on the first date, and the day was fixed for Monday, Oct. 2.

Truck transportation service will be put on through the district for high school pupils to Dixie school. It is the purpose of the board of education to make this a standard high school and the state department of education is cooperating toward this end.

THREE DEAD, 12 HURT IN FIRE AT TAMPAQUO, MEX.

TAMPAQUO, Mexico, Aug. 26.—The business district here was swept by fire yesterday. Three persons are known to be dead and 12 were seriously injured. Property damage estimated at more than 5,000,000 pesos was caused. The origin of the fire is not known.

The destruction was the worst in the history of this port. Twenty-five commercial houses were wiped out by the flames, while several others were torn down in an effort to check the fire's spread. A collection of chemicals in a drug store while burning were in the cause of deaths.

ASSASSIN WAS WAITING FOR POINCARÉ, IS CLAIM

PARIS, Aug. 26.—French secret service operative, last night arrested and charged with the assassination of President Poincaré, in the belief that he was an agent of the German espionage organization, sent here, to accuse the President Poincaré. He proved, however, to be a respectable French manufacturer and was released.

The government secret service, it was learned, has been informed that a member of the notorious German espionage organization "Rosen" has arrived in Paris to kill President Poincaré. The promise now is regarded more strictly than ever.
