DISTRICT MEETING AT DIXIE SCHOOL

County Supt. R. E. Sentelle la Thursday night attended a meet at Dixie school for all the commiteemen of the western Edgecombe consolidated school district. The following school are located in this district: Dixie, Nobles Mill, Powell Oakdale, Juvenile, Pleasant Hill, Progress, Oak Grove, Lanester, Terrence Hall.

Elementary schools will be conducted in these places and all big school pupils will be transported to Dixie for instruction at present, at later on to a new central high school that will be erected during the present year near the Calhoun place, 2 miles east of Rocky Mount.

The commiteemen for the district are J. A. Brake, J. M. Price, G. J. Stullings, Dixie district; W. H. Kilbrew, Frank Gafford, B. W. Brown Nobles Mill district; J. A. Daughtridge, G. W. Bradley, W. W. Book, Oak Dale district; W. A. Peat, Paul Taylor, T. P. Daughtridge, Juvenile district; R. T. Tolton, Dewey Pitt, Joseph Myers, Powell Oakdale; C. D. Womble, Temperance Hall district; S. R. Jenkins, J. I. Lanester, Lanester district.

Most of the officers were represented in the meeting Thursday evening. The object of the meeting was to lay plans for the opening of the schools in the district. It was unanimously voted that the schools open on the same date, and the day was fixed for Monday, Oct. 2.

Truck transportation service will be put on through the district to high school pupils to Dixie school. It is the purpose of the board of education to make this a standard high school and the state department of education is cooperating toward this end.

EXPEDITION HOME BOUND, SAYS RADIO

FREEMONT, Maine, Aug. 26.—The Bellin Land expedition, in command of Donald B. MacMillan which left Boston a year ago to the schooner Bedouin, is on its way home, according to a radio message from the explorer, received by his wife here today. The message said they had a trim trip and all were well.

THREE DEAD, 12 HURT IN FIRE AT TAMPA, FLA.

TAMPA, Fla., Aug. 26.—The business district here was swept by fire yesterday. Three sections of town to burn and 12 were seriously injured. Property damage estimated at more than \$6,000,000 pesos was caused. The origin of the fire is unknown.

The conflagration was the worst in the history of this city. Twenty-nine commercial houses were wiped out by the flames, while several others were torn down in an effort to check the fire's spread. Acetylene gas tanks were in the cause of deaths.

ASSASSIN WAS WAITING FOR POINCARE, IS CLAIM

PARIS, Aug. 26.—French secret service operators last night arrested man closely resembling the noted spy Guerrier, in the belief that he was an agent of the German central organization sent here to assassinate Premier Poincare. He proved, however, to be a respectable French manufacturer and was released.

The government secret service, it was learned, has been informed that a member of the notorious German secret action "General" has arrived in Paris to kill Premier Poincare. The premise now is regarded more seriously than ever.
