ERECTION OF CONCRETE STANDS AT STATE COLLEGE

Ground has been broken for the new section of concrete stands which are to be erected on Riddick Field at State College by the class of 1923. The contract is being handled by P. N. Howard, of Raleigh, and the work will be rushed to completion in time for the opening game of the gridiron on September 30.

The new addition will be located immediately south and will form a part of the stands already in place on the west side of the field. It is made possible by the generosity of the incoming senior class, each member of which pledged five dollars to erect the section as a memorial gift to the college. When finished the section will seat 300 people and a bronze tablet will credit its erection to the class of 1923.

ATTEMPT TO WRECK A PASSENGER TRAIN

MACON, Ga., Aug. 26.—Central of Georgia railroad officials have announced that they were investigating an alleged deliberate attempt to wreck a passenger train from Montgomery Friday morning at Byron, Ga. The official report presented by Engineer Bittick, on which the investigation is being made, shows that some one placed two large nuts, fastened together with a wooden pin, on the guides in front of the crosshead on the left side of the locomotive as the train stopped at Byron. Bittick said that when the locomotive did not start properly he investigated and found the nuts. A similar attempt to wreck a train occurred here a week ago on the bridge over the Ocmulgee river.
