GERMAN GOODS USED IN PROTEST AGAINST GERMANY

BERLIN, Oct. 2.—Attention is called by the German press to the "boost" week recently held in Denmark for the benefit of home-made commodities. Dainty little flags were sold bearing the imprint: "Buy no foreign goods! Let your money come to Danish workmen."

Because of the cheap rate at which they could be secured, half of the little flags used in this Danish campaign to further local industries were bought, not in Denmark, but in Germany.

GRANTING OF DIVORCES MAKING FIUME FAMOUS

FIUME, Oct. 2.—This city counts a population of 50,000; 15,000 of them received decrees of divorce in the years 1920 and 1921. Divorce seems to be the most flourishing of the local industries, and it is making the city famous.

The reason is that the severance of the marital bond is easy here, and people desiring freedom flock to Fiume from neighboring states where divorces are not granted. Anyone can get a divorce in Fiume who has lived in the city long enough to acquire the rights of citizenship.

POSTPONE PAYMENTS OF DEBTS TO UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Definite postponement of any payment of debts owed the United States by the European nations, with the exception

of England, until the actual amount which such nations could ultimately pay, has been determined by conferences between creditors and debtors, was suggested by Reginald McKenna, former chancellor of the British exchequer, in an address before American Bankers Association today.
