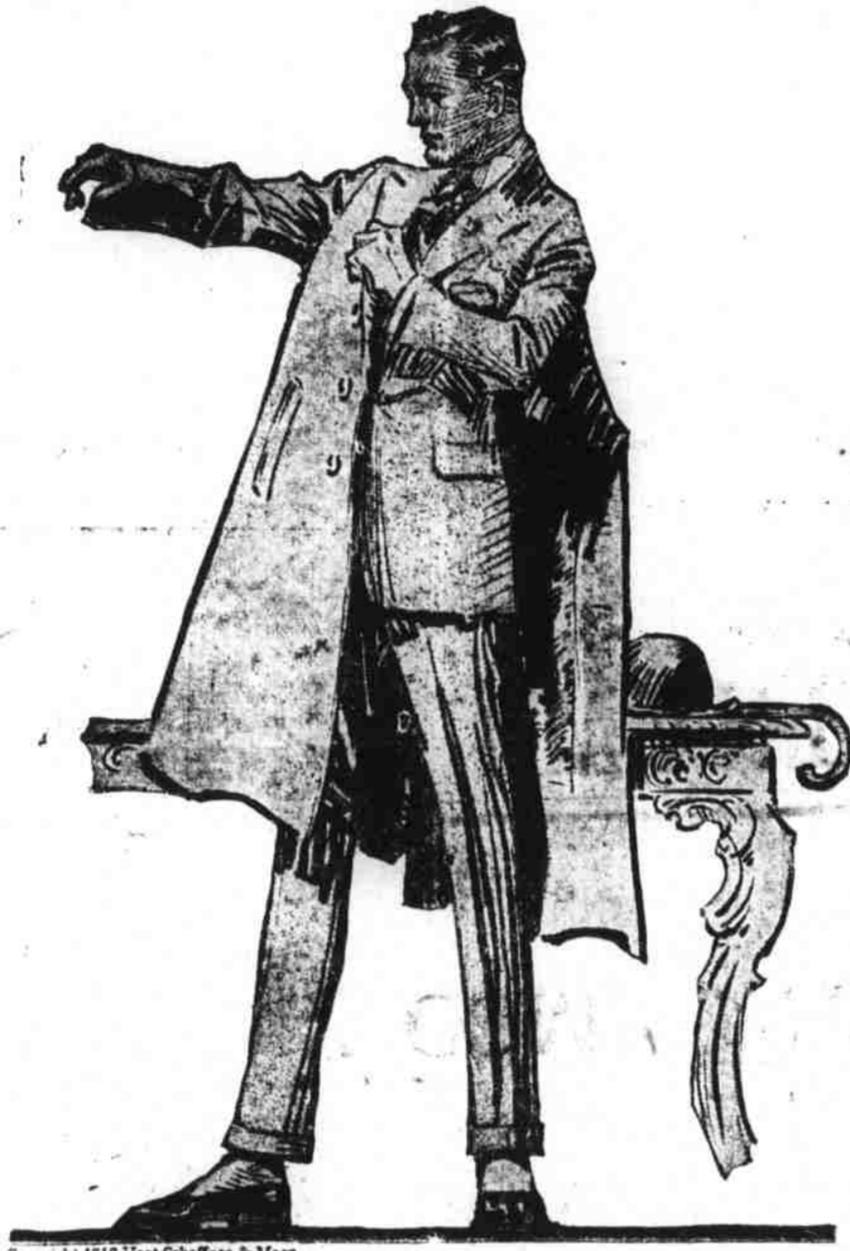

An Ordinance to Authorize the town of Pinetops, N. C., to issue Twenty Five Thousand Dollars of Bonds for an Electric Light and Power System.

The Board of Commissioners of the town of Pinetops, realizing the necessity of providing electric lighting and power facilities within the town of Pinetops, by either erecting and operating an electric plant within said town, or by purchasing such electric light and power under contract with the Town of Tarboro, or other municipal or private corporation, do this the 18th day of October, 1922, at a meeting specially called and advertised for this purpose, do hereby ordain and enact:

(a) That bonds of the said town of Pinetops be issued and sold, to provide funds to buy, build and erect an electric light and power plant within the town of Pinetops, or to buy and obtain a right of way and buy, build and erect a transmission line from Pinetops, N. C., to Tarboro, N. C., or other point, to enable said town of Pinetops to buy and transmit such necessary electricity for lighting and power purposes as it may deem necessary from the said town of Tarboro, or other corporation, and to build the necessary lines and station to distribute such electricity within the said town of Pinetops, said bonds to be issued and sold under and pursuant to the provisions of the municipal Finance

(b) That the maximum aggregate principal amount of said bonds shall not exceed the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars.

(c) That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds, shall be annually levied and collected, as said bonds severally become due and payable.

(d) That a statement of the debt of the municipality, has been filed with the clerk, pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, and is open to public inspection.

(e) The average assessed valuation of property subject to taxation by the municipality, for the three fiscal years in which taxes were last levied is \$251,030.30.

(f) The amount of the net debt of the municipality outstanding and authorized is, none; to be authorized under the provisions of this ordinance, not to exceed \$25,000.00.

(g) The Board of Commissioners deeming it advisable to obtain the assent of the voters of the municipality, and having called a special election to pass upon this question, do hereby provide and enact that this ordinance shall take effect, and be in full force, when approved by the voters of this municipality at said election.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 4th day of October, 1922, and was first published on the 21st day of October, 1922.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

# Carlton Snyder

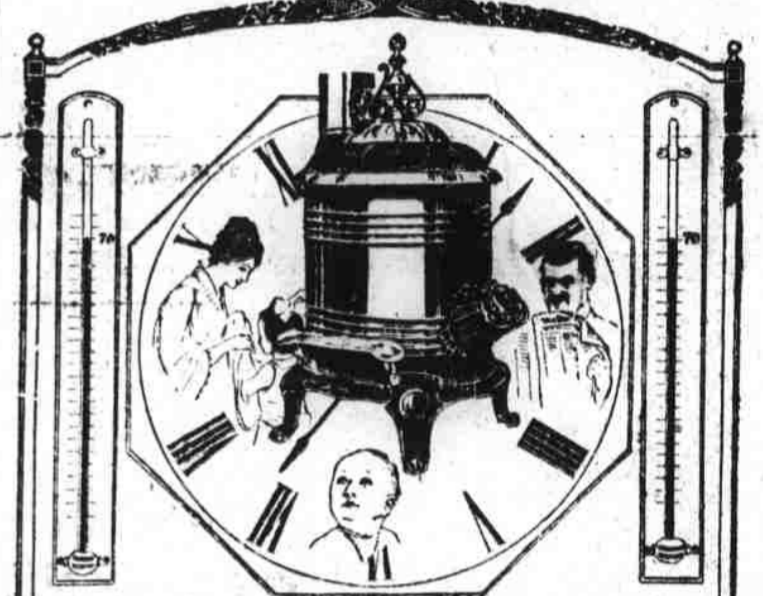
