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ECONOMIC TRANSPORTATION RIVALRY

What the jitney has done to the street railway, the motor truck and interurban passenger and freight is threatened to do to the railroad. With the improvement of highways and the development of the truck industry, the short haul profits of railroads are disappearing. It is with appreciation of this situation that President Harding, in his message to Congress, said: "Manifestly we have need to begin to coordinate all transportation facilities. We ought to turn the motor truck into a railway feeder or tributary instead of a destroying competitor."

Neither Congress nor the state much longer ignore the problem which the President has pointed out. Railroads are subject to interstate and intrastate regulations. They have their motor truck competitors, except in a few states, under practically no restrictions as to rates. Some of the states, realizing that the motor truck is reckoned with as a transportation agency of the future, have subjected them to the authority of their public service commissions, and have proposed truck transportation lines evidence that the services they propose to give is not already adequately performed by an existing carrier. The co-ordination suggested by the President runs into the complication of diverse jurisdiction. Truck lines are intrastate in character. As the government has jurisdiction over transportation facilities of this nature, this phase can be dealt with only through co-ordination of State and national regulatory agencies.

All the ramifications of the complex transport problem, none is more acute than the need of greater co-ordination of effort both between railroads, the inland waterways and the other competing methods of transportation, and between the different railroads themselves, many of which are uneconomically located, a hindrance instead of a help to efficient transportation. This country has not progressed as far as Europe in the co-ordination of transportation facilities. The lesson is one to which Congress and the states will soon be forced to draw their serious attention.—Virginia Pilot.
