### WGTU COLUMN

Nine states have already adopted state wide prohibition. Of the other thirty nine states so much territory is "dry" that more than 47,000,000 of our population are now living under prohibition, the saloonless area of the United States being seventy-one per cent of the entire country. At the present time, five states, Washington, Oregon, California, Colorado and Virginia, are engaged in campaigns for State wide prohibition next November. Two others, Idaho and Arizona are planning for like campaigns. Iowa, Texas, Utah and Florida are working to secure state-wide prohibition next year. Other states are stirring in the matter. People are everywhere aroused and the prohibition idea advances by leaps and bounds.

Resolutions sent to Congress through the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union endorsing the Shepherd-Hobson amendment represent at this writing over 3,600,000 persons, and they are still coming. The resolution, adopted by churches, young people's societies, clubs and other organizations and by public meetings, reads as follows:

"Resolved, That we are in hearty favor of National Constitutional Prohibition, and will do all within our power to secure the adoption of an amendment to the Constitution forever prohibiting the sale, manufacture for sale, transportation for sale, importation for sale, and exportation for sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes in the United States, in accordance with the Joint Resolution introduced in the United States Congress by Congressman Richmond Pearson Hobson.

California wine makers have

been vigorously opposing state-wide, and of course Unionwide prohibition upon the ground that it would destroy the grape industry, and they have been sending out appeals to grape growers and other voters of the State setting forth their point of view. It has developed, however, according to the California voice, that "prohibition would be a financial gain instead of loss to grape growers." Winemakers, it appears, pay from \$8 to \$10 a ton for grapes, while manufacturers of grape juice and other large buyers of grapes not used to making wine, pay a regular market price of \$32 a ton. With the elimination of the fermented beverage would come a greater demand for the unfermented and for the fruit *au naturel*.

Federal Judge Landis of Chicago was asked the other day to appoint a receiver for a certain saloon. "I have gone out of the retail liquor business, replied the judge. "I'll order the receiver to close the business at once."

### MRS. SETH DUTCHER DEAD

The body of Mrs. Seth Dutcher was brought here Saturday night from Norfolk, where she died Saturday afternoon and was taken to the old home at Jarvisburg, Currituck county, Sunday morning for the funeral and interment. Mrs. Dutcher was 27 years old and is survived by her husband and one child.

### FRIENDS NOT ENEMIES

The insects that have recently disturbed the minds of the cotton farmers of Possum Quarter and gotten credit for destroying their cotton have been found to be harmless and friendly lady beetles who feed upon cotton louse and not upon the cotton plant. This is the information given by State Entomologist Franklin Sherman, Jr.
