HOW TO KNOW YOUR UWN COUNTY

Chapel Hill, Nov. 16-Extension Series Bullletin Number 12 on the eaching of County Geography is now ready, for distribution. This bulletin was gotten up for the University Bureau of Extension v Prof. M. C. S. Noble. Dean of the School of Education. 'rof. Noble says in the introducion, 'the purpose of this bulletin s to give methods and suggestions to those teachers who wish to teach heir pupils the geography of their county. In this study Orange County is used as a model. n outline of topics is presented nd then follows a brief presentation of the Geography of Orange County based on this outline. Pro fessor Noble is of the opinion that careful reading of the outlint and of the presentation of Orange County Geography will suggest to teachers in other countles how they may follow the same outline in teaching the geo raphy and history of their own county.

The general outline for this study falls under five heads: Physical-Pol'tiral; Historical Political; Indusries; towns; History and Education. Each of these heads is then taken up in detail.

Realizing that a bare outline of county geography and history would be insufficient; Professor Noble follows this up with a resume of Orange County geography and history. For instance among the items taken up under the historical political heading, he shows for whom the county was nmed and by whom settled, population, occupation, crops wealth of county, road system manufacturers, towns and

The last five pages of the buffetin are given over to suggestive questions for the teaching or county reography and history, taking Orange County as a model. As professor Noble points out the purpose of these questions, and or the ouline in general, is to aid the pupil in building history by writing at least one sentence under each topic of the out-

One of the most striking features of the syllabus is the collection of illustrations. Seventeen cuts were used in the compilation of this little forty page bulletin. One of the pictures shows the Orange County Court House at Hillsboro, and the clock in the tower which was presented to the town by King George III in 1769 and has been a reliable timepiece ever since. The most striking illustration is a double page map of Orange County drawn by Professor Noble. It is probably Make an appointment or Phone the only map of its kind in existence.

November 22 vicence of what appears to be a weil or, an zed campa gn to deluge tirmers throughout the country into buying an alleged cure for hog cholera, under the impression that hs has been investigated and approved by the United States Government, has reached the department of Agricu.ture. Articles praising h s medicine, Benetol by name, are being sent out widespread to news These articles are so worded that it appears that the department of Agriculture had received reports from the State of Minnesota showing that the medi me had proved most beneficial. matter of fact the one report received by the Department was an unofficial and unsolicited statement sent presumably from the promoters themselves. The Department attaches no importance whatsoever in this statement. It has no resson to believe in the efficacy of any proprietary cure tor hog cholera and does not recommend any. Un der certain conditions it urges farmers to protect their stock with antihog-cholera serum but that is all.

In connection with this attempt it may be said that the med cine which is now put forth as rood for hogs was advertised some time ago as means for killing tuberculosis, typhoid, and cancer germs, according to an article published by the American Medical Asso lation. At that time it was asserted that the army was interested in it. As a matter of fact the army was no more interested then than the Department of Agriculture is now.

In view of the evidence that the attempt to create this talse impression is persistent and widespread, all nog owners are warned to communicat with Dr. F. D. Owen. Raleigh, N. C. before accelding as true any statement that the Government recommends any treatment other than the serum at ready ment oned.
