## SPECIAL SERVICES IN CITY CHURCHES

**Thanksgiving Day Will  
be Fittingly Observed  
and Offering for Or-  
phans Taken**

Special services will be held in a number of the city's churches on Thanksgiving Day at eleven o'clock in the morning, though some of the churches will hold their Thanksgiving service on Wednesday night. Rev. G. T. Adams, presiding elder of this district, will preach the Thanksgiving sermon on Wednesday night at the First Methodist Church. The members and friends of the church are cordially invited to attend and bring an offering for the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh and the pastor has suggested that each member make a contribution equal to one day's income.

A prayer service will be held Wednesday night at Blackwell Memorial church and the regular Thanksgiving service will be held Thanksgiving morning at eleven o'clock. For both of these services the pastor has urged a full attendance of the church membership and the giving of one day's income to the Thomasville Orphanage.

At Christ Church there will be service Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. Thanksgiving day at 11 a. m. All those making donations for the Thanksgiving decoration of the church are requested to send same to vestry room Wednesday afternoon. The offering Thanksgiving Day will be for the new heating system. All members of the congregation have been requested to respond. Bishop Darst will visit the church next Sunday night to confirm those wishing to connect themselves with Christ Church at this time.

## FARMERS WARNED AGAINST REMEDY

**United States Department  
of Agriculture Has  
not Endorsed New Chol-  
era "Cure"**

Washington, D. C., November 22—A notice of what appears to be a well organized campaign to delude farmers throughout the country into buying an alleged cure for hog cholera, under the impression that this has been investigated and approved by the United States Government, has reached the department of Agriculture. Articles praising this medicine, Benetol by name, are being sent out widespread to news papers. These articles are so worded that it appears that the department of Agriculture had received reports from the State of Minnesota showing that the medicine had proved most beneficial. As a matter of fact the one report received by the Department was an unofficial and unsolicited statement sent presumably from the promoters themselves. The Department attaches no importance whatsoever to this statement. It is no reason to believe in the efficacy of any proprietary cure for hog cholera and does not recommend any. Under certain conditions it urges farmers to protect their stock with anti-hog-cholera serum but that is all.

In connection with this attempt it may be said that the medicine, which is now put forth as food for hogs, was advertised some time ago as means for killing tuberculosis, typhoid, and cancer germs, according to an article published by the American Medical Association. At that time it was asserted that the army was interested in it. As a matter of fact the army was no more interested than the Department of Agriculture is now.

In view of the evidence that the attempt to create this false impression is persistent and widespread, all hog owners are warned to communicate with Dr. F. D. Owen, Raleigh, N. C. before accepting any statement that the Government recommends any treatment other than the serum already mentioned.
