The high school at Poplar Branch is not a county but a township institution. If the Popuar Branch high school were trying 'to make itself the one and only h gh school in the county this paper would not be favorable toward the undertaking. The provision of the state school law which permits four high schools to the county but no more than four is wise in its scope and in its limitations. There will be ' in a comparatively short time need for at least one more high school in Currituck County.
