In Co-operation With State Division of Markets Will Inaugurate Daily Wire Reports of All Market Conditions and Movement of Potatoes From Competing Sections.

# IS BIG THING FOR TRUCK FARMER

#### Prevents Gluts And Promotes Efficient Distribution With Resultant Better Prices

The United States Department of loupes, reaches, apples and pota er ablishing in Elizabeth City a Field Branch Station, which is to work in co-peration with the State Division of Markets, for the distribu ion of markets news throughout the potato sesson.

P. C. Isbell and W. B. Walker of Washington arrived June first to get this service started. Mr. W. R. Camp, Chi f of he Nor'h Caro-I'm Division of Mar ets is also on the gound for a few days with Mr C. E Haskett who will later assume charge of this work.

Erch day the information regarding mar et conditions in the principal citi's and movement of potatoes from moducing sections will be assembled by wire and distributed, form this station by telephone, telegraph, mail and bu'letins.

The bulletins will be i sued about 12:30 p. m. each day and are for free distribution to producers, shippers and all who are interested in the movement of this crop. reports give quantities crisinating from the different competing sections, the errivals that same day upon the principal markets, and the prices prevailing that same morn-

This work has been carried on with arent success in leading produ leg conters of many perishable co smodi is such as strawberries, toentoes asparais, onfens, canta-

A le ture, through the Office of tees. It is hoped that this service Markets and Rural Organization is may be continued here for the sweet potato shipping season as well.

> This work has given shippers in other sections an opportunity to intelligently distriute their produce on favorable markets and to save themselves los er on overstocked

> In the matter of the recent Texas Orion deal, it has been estimated growers and shippers have been saved nearly a million deflars through the market news service. A rf gle bronch shipping association in the Arkansas strawberry section reports that by use of these daf'y bulletins, one car was so advantageously moved as to pay that station's entire cost for telegrams from a near by Branch office of Markets.

Individual shippers, brokers. and al' fac'ors connected with the potato deal derive similar benefits.
