FEDERAL MARKET NEWS BUREAU WILL NOW BE ESTABLISHED HERE

In Co-operation With State Division of Markets
Will Inaugurate Daily Wire Reports of All Market
Conditions and Movement of Potatoes From
Competing Sections.

IS BIG THING FOR TRUCK FARMER

Prevents Gluts And Promotes Efficient Distribution
With Resultant Better Prices

The United States Department of Agriculture, through the Office of Markets and Rural Organization is establishing in Elizabeth City a Field Branch Station, which is to work in co-operation with the State Division of Markets, for the distribution of market news throughout the potato season.

P. C. Isbell and W. B. Walker of Washington arrived June first to get this service started. Mr. W. R. Camp, Chief of the North Carolina Division of Markets is also on the ground for a few days with Mr. C. E. Haskett who will later assume charge of this work.

Each day the information regarding market conditions in the principal cities and movement of potatoes from producing sections will be assembled by wire and distributed, from this station by telephone, telegraph, mail and bulletins.

The bulletins will be issued about 12:30 p. m. each day and are for free distribution to producers, shippers and all who are interested in the movement of this crop. These reports give quantities originating from the different competing sections, the arrivals that same day upon the principal markets, and the prices prevailing that same morning.

This work has been carried on with great success in leading producing centers of many perishable commodities such as strawberries, tomatoes, asparagus, onions, cantaloupes, peaches, apples and potatoes. It is hoped that this service may be continued here for the sweet potato shipping season as well.

This work has given shippers in other sections an opportunity to intelligently distribute their produce on favorable markets and to save themselves loss on overstocked markets.

In the matter of the recent Texas Onion deal, it has been estimated growers and shippers have been saved nearly a million dollars through the market news service. A single branch shipping association in the Arkansas strawberry section reports that by use of these daily bulletins, one car was so advantageously moved as to pay that station's entire cost for telegrams from a near by Branch office of Markets.

Individual shippers, brokers, and all factors connected with the potato deal, derive similar benefits. Any desirous of securing these daily marked bulletins by mail may obtain them free of cost upon application to C. E. 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DARE COUNTY POSTMASTER CHARGED WITH EMBEZZLEMENT

WILL BE TRIED BEFORE COMMISSIONER WILSON MONDAY MORNING

Mr. Paul Mann of Manns Harbor was brought before United States Commissioner, T. B. Wilson Thursday morning on the charge of embezzlement of government funds coming into Mann's hands as postmaster at Manns Harbor.

Mann was placed under a bond of five hundred dollars to appear before the Commissioner again on Monday morning at which time Postmaster Inspector Yarboro will be here as a witness for the government.

Mann, it is stated, does not deny that he is short in his post office accounts but claims that his offense was due to carelessness and not to any intent to defraud.

Mann is widely known in Dare county where he has always been regarded as a citizen of good character. The amount he is alleged to have misappropriated is \$464.00. He was brought to Elizabeth City Tuesday by United States Deputy Marshal J. R. Williams.

Mann is forty five years old and unmarried. He was removed from the post office at Manns Harbor about two months ago.
