ernment filled by incompetent men appointed only for reasons of partisan politics. They have dulled the moral sense of the people. They have taught us that peace, the peace of cowardice and dishonor to the welfare of others, is to be put above righteousness, above the stern and unflinching performance of duty whether the duty is pleasant or unpleasant. Yet in Mexico they have failed to secure the peace that they thus sought; and they have failed in spite of the most ample opportunity and most ample warning, to prepare in any real fashion to meet the crisis which their own policy invited.

Mr. Hughes has shown in his career the instinct of efficiency which will guarantee that, under him, the government will once more work with vigor and force. He possesses that habit of straightforward thinking which means that his words will be correlated with his deeds and translated into facts. His past career is the warrant for our belief that he will be the unflinching opponent of that system of invisible government which finds expression in the domination of the party boss and the party machine. His past career is a guarantee that whatever he says before election will be made by his acts after election. Morally, his public record shows him to be a man of unbending integrity; intellectually, it shows him to be a man of original and trained ability. We have the alternative of continuing in office an administration which has proved a lamentable failure, or of putting into office an administration which we have every reason to believe will function with efficiency for the interest and honor of all our people. I earnestly bespeak from my fellow Progressives their unflinching support of Mr. Hughes.

the chamber from the rear of the rostrum, all assembled arose at the order of the clerk to remain until the court had been formally convened. Accompanying the Lord Chief Justice were his two associates who will assist in rendering the final sentence after the jury has decided the guilt or innocence of Casement and Bailey.

The jury twelve men, all apparently over the prescribed military age, filed into the box shortly before the arrival of the justices. Unlike an American trial of equal magnitude, there was no wrangling of counsel in selecting the jurors. Rules of the court declare that the jury shall be summoned by the sheriff and that dignitary performed his task without fuss, friction, fear or favor. A printed list of names of British subjects eligible for jury service was all the data needed by the sheriff. He simply notified each prospective juror that he must serve, and unless there was serious objection, the juror took his place in the box. The jury for this trial was obtained with in an hour.

Conscientious objection to capital punishment does not enter into the psychology of British jurors, it was explained to the United Press in court today. British law calls upon the jury merely to decide the guilt or innocence of the accused, and the responsibility for the sentence then passes to the judge or judges. Accompanied by a single guard, the prisoners entered the court from a door at the side. Every eye in the chamber followed the tall, lean and almost gaunt figure of Casement as he stepped to his place and was seated after he had stiffly bowed toward the justices' bench. Not awed in the least, the noted defendant quickly looked about the room and smilingly nodded to several acquaintances. He then picked up a large note pad and awaited proceedings.

Among the lawyers for Casement is Michel F. Doyle of Philadelphia.

Submarine Gets Liner

Many Ships In Battle

Berlin, June 24.—About two hundred British warships, including thirty dreadnaughts, nine battle cruisers, six armored cruisers, 113 small cruisers and forty destroyers participated in the battle in the Shager Rak off Jutland, on Wednesday, May 31st.
