## News Letter From Raleigh

(Special Correspondence.)

Raleigh, N. C., July 18.—The coming of Uncle Joe Cannon and some other Republican spellbinders to North Carolina during the approaching campaign is exciting some interest and discussion. The Republicans are anxious to capture the next Congress, and it is understood that they have designs on several North Carolina districts—the third, eighth and tenth, and probably the seventh and ninth—being the fields which they intend to cultivate.

Talking about the tenth district with Commissioner of Labor and Printing Shipman, whose home is in that district, and who is especially well qualified to speak on the subject, I am told that the prospects of Republicans there are not very encouraging this year; that, on the contrary, "the Democrats are sure to redeem that district in November." The nomination of Mr. Weaver has given entire satisfaction, and there are no "disgruntled" Democrats in the tenth this year. Lack of harmony and consequent disorganization among the Democrats two years ago made the election of Britt (Republican) possible. "The district is normally Democratic," Mr. Shipman added. "Weaver is a strong candidate and, besides, the Republicans never carry the district twice in succession."

Commissioner Shipman spent a week in the tenth district recently, and he knows what he is talking about, for he is one of the clearest thinkers and hardest party workers in the State. "We are united to a man this year with all of us enthusiastically for Weaver, and we are just as certain to put Congressman Britt out of business in November as any future contingency can be." Mr. Shipman left Raleigh Saturday for Buffalo, New York, to attend the annual convention of the National Association of Governmental Labor Officials of the United States and Canada, which is in session there this week.

### KEEP THE RUBBER TRUE

The announced purpose of the Republicans should, however, place the Democrats in all the counties on their guard. Republican activity for congressional candidates will, of course, have its effect on the candidates for State and county offices and for the legislature, and our folks should not run the risk of allowing the interests of any nominee to suffer by default—lack of effort because of fancied security is one of the most dangerous shoals that threaten navigation along the political sea-coast. "Keep the rubber true."

### FARM WOMEN'S CONVENTION

The program for the Farm Women's Convention, which meets in Raleigh, at the A. & M. College, August 29-31, has been prepared. It shows that prominent experts will deliver addresses on that occasion, including Mrs. Kate Brew Vaughan noted lecturer and demonstrator on home economics. Every "farm woman" who attends will be certain to

derive benefit, as well as enjoying what promises to be a most pleasant occasion.

### STATE FUNDS FOR COUNTY FAIRS

Commissioner of Agriculture Graham desires to be notified at once by all the counties which contemplate holding county fairs this year so he can apportion the fund each is to receive. All county fairs, which desire to share in the \$5,000 appropriation which the State makes for this purpose must notify the State Department of Agriculture by August 10th.

### TARHEEL SOLDIERS IN GOOD SHAPE

The health of the Tarheel soldiers at Camp Glenn seems to have been carefully looked after, according to Dr. W. S. Rankin, Secretary of the State Board of Health, who has returned to Raleigh after completing a sanitary survey of the camp, during which he inspected the water supply, handling of food, kitchen facilities and conditions, and methods of disposition of waste and sewerage arrangements. Dr. Rankin, who will prepare a formal report on the subject, states that the sanitary conditions at Camp Glenn are so good that many towns could advantageously pattern after the "military City."

While some of the boys are represented as chafing under the restraint of mobilization camp life and are "anxious to be free" — at least to the point of proceeding to the Mexican border—the "old folks at home" and most of their friends hope that they will never be called upon for actual service in Mexico, from which so many of them would be apt to succumb to the disease peculiar to that climate if they escaped Mexican bullets — and "the knife under the fifth rib."

### BETTER CARE OF SOLDIERS' HOME VETERANS.

Col. A. H. Boyden, of Salisbury; Gen. J. S. Carr, of Durham, and Col. W. P. Wood, State Auditor, the three most active members of the Soldiers' Home board of directors, together with the other members of the board, have ordered increased facilities for the care of the 155 old veterans now at the home here, which include an additional nurse and an assistant housekeeper. All these old soldiers are over 70 years of age, and most of them spend much of their declining days in the hospital wards. In a few more years the last of them will have passed into the Better World. Meanwhile they are fortunate in having such devoted friends as Col. Boyden, General Carr, and Col. Wood.
