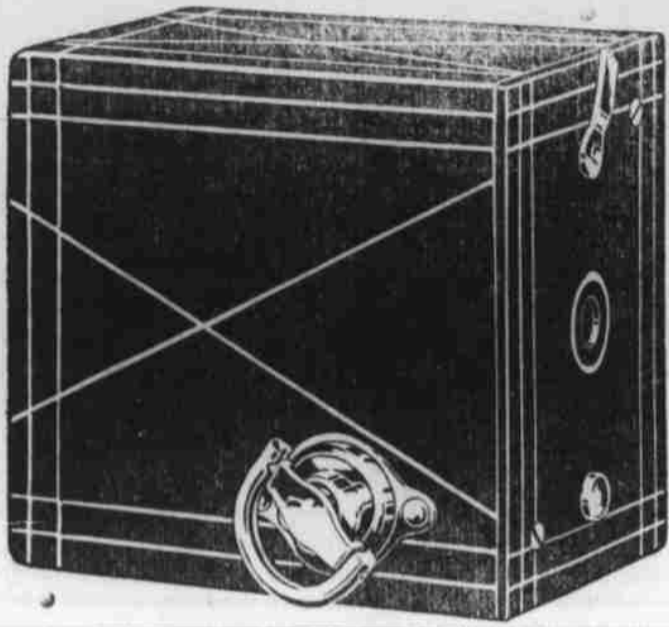

## Board Makes New Tax Levy

The board of county commissioners, in session Monday, fixed the tax levy for the ensuing year at 84 1/2c, a reduction of 6 1/2c, as compared with the levy of last year. This levy includes both state and county taxes.

W. J. Woodley appeared before the board representing the Highway Commission and asked for a levy of 29c, for road tax, instead of 18c, as at present, but thought the matter was presented to the board in form of a motion, the increase failed of passage for lack of a second to the motion. The Highway Commission asked for a road levy of 29c last year, as compared to 12c for the year before, and the board this year was evidently not minded to go above last year's increase.

Dr. John Saliba, of the Elizabeth City Hospital, appeared before the board to ask for an appropriation to pay the board bill of Ellis Hollowell colored, who underwent an operation and treatment in the institution for appendicitis. Dr. Saliba stated that he was entirely willing to donate his own services in performing the operation, but he thought that the county should pay the negro's board bill. The commissioners, however, felt under no obligation in the matter, inasmuch as treatment had been given the negro without authority from them. It was further pointed out that Hollowell is an all-abled farm hand in the employ of J. S. Morris, at whose instance the negro was received in the institution.

## End of Strike A Union Victory

New York, Aug. 8.—Normal car traffic was resumed today after a strike of a little more than a week's duration.

Though refusing to meet the specific demands of the Union, the street car companies recognized the right of the carmen to organize and agreed to receive a committee from the Union to discuss terms of settlement.

The victory is regarded as one of the greatest ever won by the Union, and the strike has been characterized as having been remarkably free from violence.

Ninety four per cent of the train men favor a strike unless their demands are met, according to the official tabulation of the vote just made public this morning.
