WOMAN'S SPHERE AT STATE FAIR

NOT EVEN THE BETTER BABIES WILL ATTRACT MORE ATTENTION THIS YEAR

Raleigh, N. C. Oct. 11.—The Home Demonstration Division will branch out in its exhibits at the State Fair this year, and not only will it show products canned in glass from the different counties organized in Canning Club work, but will show in six booths the different industries being taught the women and girls who belong to the Home Demonstration Clubs.

In Booth No. 1 Mrs. Gordon Payne, one of the field agents, assisted by Miss Marcie Albertson of Deep River, will have installed a large old-fashioned loom, and demonstrate the weaving of rugs and curtains, and on a small hand-loom she will weave samples of cloth and tapestry.

Booth No. 2 will show baskets woven of pine needle sticks and rice straw, while on the other side of the booth demonstrations of cross-stitch embroidery will be in progress. Some of the clubs have done well at work in both of these industries, the cross-stitch finding a market in Philadelphia, and the baskets all over the North. Miss Rhodes the agent for Chowan county will demonstrate with the aid of Miss Dickens, of Johnston County, cross-stitch and basket-making.

Booth No. 3 will contain the home conveniences which have been introduced into the different counties in North Carolina and Miss Grace Schaefer, assistant to Mrs. McKimmon, will demonstrate the electric and gas pressure cooker, an electric refrigerator, an ironing-board, floor mop, roller tray, fly trap, etc.

Booth No. 4 will house two young Canning Club girls, who will demonstrate the canning of beans, tomatoes and pimentos. Mrs. Morris will show in this booth the different products canned by the girls, how they are packed commercially and just how to serve them. A beautiful display of commercial jellies will also be shown here.

In Booth No. 5 Mrs. Henley, field

agent, and Miss Eunice Penny, agent for Davidson County, will show how to dress a fowl for market, how to pack and grade eggs, and the different parcel post packages in which they may be shipped.

In booth No. 6 Miss Jamison, Home Demonstration assistant, will preside over a modern kitchen, and will show how to serve a well balanced meal, how to make delectable dishes and how to conserve time by the use of the fireless cooker. Miss Jamison will be assisted by Miss Annie Lee Rankin, agent from Mecklenburg.

The large Canning Club booth will be presided over by Mrs. Estelle Smith, of Wayne County, and Miss Ola Stephenson of Guilford.
