Mexican officials have announced that Chihuahua City, the key to northern Mexico fell Monday. The Carranzista defenders were cut into ribbons, divided and routed to the north and the south of the city.

Villa took possession. The gravest anxiety is felt for the six Americans in Chihuahua City. Some reports state that Villa slaugh tered the foreigners, others that they were sent borderward. Secretary Lansing's agents have demanded news of the Amerians, from the Carranzistas at Juarez, across the Rio Grande. In addition to the Americans there were a number of Germans, French and Chinese in Chihuahua City, and at last account the British Consul, Captain Scobell and the French Consul were there.

It is believed that the Carranza General, Ozuna with 100 cavalry, lost half by desertions, and Commender Trevino escaped southward. with 700 men.
