OUR OLD FRIEND DR. DRANE HOLDS SERVICE SUNDAY

Friend of Fort Raleigh Predecessor of Impressive Service Held on August 18th

More than three hundred people attended the Memorial Service commemorating the 34th anniversary of the birth of Virginia Dare, first white child born in America, at historic Fort Raleigh Sunday.

Rev. Robert B. Drane, D. D., of Manteo gave the unveiling address and pointed out that the baptism of Virginia Dare when she was but two days old characterized the religious aspect which was one of the inducements that prompted colonization of new worlds more than three centuries ago.

Despite the religious character of the people who colonized America no mention has been found in history of an ordained minister in the lost Roanoke colony and it is considered problematical that the rites of baptism were administered to the first born, whose birth was commemorated Sunday, by some lay member of the Church of England.

It was altogether appropriate that Dr. Drane should have been selected

to make the address at the unveiling of a tablet which was made by the Gorham company just before unveiling the tablet. Dr. Drane had Miss Mabel Evans read the inscription to the audience.

The following program was carried out at the service: Invocation by Rev. W. N. Vaughan, pastor of the Wanchese Methodist Church, Hymn, "Our Fathers God to Thee" prayer service led by Rev. Fred E. Drane of Monroe, N. C., Scripture reading by Rev. H. B. Hines, pastor of the Manteo Baptist Church, Hymn, "My Faith Looks up to Thee," Unveiling of tablet and address by Dr. Drane, Hymn, "O God Our Help in Ages Past," and benediction pronounced by Rev. A. E. Brown, pastor of the Manteo Methodist Church.

The choir was directed by Miss Margaret Hines.
