A NOTED NEGRO WOMAN RETURNS TO BIRTHPLACE

Thirty Years Since Mrs. Ida Munger of California Lived On Roanoke Island

A negro woman who has risen to places of distinction and who now occupies an important role in the organization and management of many civic and religious organizations in California, Mrs. Ida A. Phierley Munger, is visiting in Dare County this week. She has been in the east since July, having come from California as a delegate to the Baltimore Convention of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored people. Twice married and now a widow for 22 years, she was known last on Roanoke Island as Ida Baker. She is the daughter of the late Capt. Richard Etheridge, for many years the officer in charge of the Old Pea Island Life Saving Station. She was educated at Shaw University, and following the death of her parents, who had a comfortable home on the North-end of Roanoke Island, she saw few opportunities here for an educated colored woman, and went west. She lived over 20 years in Ohio and Illinois, where she taught, and worked as a dressmaker working with white and colored, for there are no color lines, to hamper one. She now resides in Santa Monica, California, and her educational and civic work embraces activities among the Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts. Y. W. C. A., and she is a member of the Los Angeles county executive local boards of the Y. W. C. A. She also has the organization of colored unions throughout Los Angeles County, there being a hundred thousand colored people among a population of one million or more people.

Returning to Roanoke Island after an absence of 30 years, she finds barely the old family grave-yard remaining of the old home place, now with ferns, gage, house-plant, and pine trees thirty feet high growing on the land. Many of her old acquaintances are dead. She is 66 years old, and finds strange faces and strange people, and most astounding of all, strange new developments that destroy the old time charm in which she was reared.

She paid a visit to old Pea Island Station, and the New as the guest of Capt. Ed. Pruden, and while riding in a horse cart, suffered a broken nose-when an automobile collided with it in the night. Truly she thinks, the old times are gone. But she got a lot of pleasure out of her visits with a number of old friends like Dick Daniels, and the Henry Woodley family, Joe Berry and many others. And there was many friends among the white race who were delighted to see her, for her education and refinement and culture were learned her head, as many expected to see. She will visit her sister, Maggie in Norfolk before returning to California.
