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DIED IN AIRPLANE CRASH WHILE BEING CARRIED TO HOSPITAL

Tragic Story of Death of Cape Hatteras Boy Over 13 Years Ago

Down in the lonely piney hills of Cape Hatteras stands an old, old, homestead. Many years ago a young husband built that house for his bride, and a few years later the place rang out with the gleeful coos of baby voices which grew in the more boisterous roars of healthy youngsters, and on to the pleasant tones of splendid young men and women.

Many moons have passed since one of the young sons of that home was stricken down with pneumonia. He was the eighteen year old son, Landra, of Mr. and Mrs. U. B. Williams. He lay very ill near unto death, the local doctor said he must be rushed to the hospital at once, surgeons must operate, his last chance, his only hope of life.

A plane was hurriedly ordered and within an hour the big airship was landing on the shoals. The sick young man was hurriedly prepared for the trip, and after having said goodby to his loved ones, who had tried so hard to be brave he again embraced his mother, who seemed so reluctant to part from him, and as he looked into her tear-filled eyes he said, "mother if I don't see you anymore in this world, I will meet you in Heaven." His mother clung to him, he was her boy, the child of her heart, yet they must take him away. There was no room for her on the big air-ship, and it was waiting. "Send Me Word—Just As Soon" the mother pleaded brokenly, eyes glued to the form of her boy on the stretcher. "Just as soon as we get there you shall hear," the father called back.

The young man was then put on board the plane and the anxious old father climbed beside him, and the big ship sailed out into the Heavens. All the loving mother could do was watch and pray, which she did, as back into her little home amidst the hills she waited for news from her boy.

About twilight it came. "Our Boy has been drowned, I was rescued unhurt," the telegram from the father read. Those who heard will never forget the distressing screams that rang out thru' the Cape woods, from the mother and loved ones of the homestead in the hills, back on December 23, 1924.

Other facts concerning the accident came later, and friends and loved ones learned that the plane had been disabled on striking an air-pocket before reaching its goal. The pilot realized his plane could not land safely and wired

for a rescue crew to be in waiting. When they landed the deck was crowded with divers and rescuers, but the plane sank quickly, drowning the sick boy, and killing the operator and two doctors, while the father and pilot were rescued unhurt. Time has come—stained the walls, left a mother feeble and old and taken the father and flown away as if on dozens of pairs of wings, taking with it to far off lands, the babe a loving mother had reared to manhood and womanhood, and left a widowed mother yearning, wondering what she has been spared for. Yet she busies herself in and around her home waiting the summons to the Home where her son promised to meet her.
