THE DIFFERENCE IN TWO MEN

Some men in business make you like them. Some conduct themselves in such a manner you can seldom ever respect them. Once when we became indebted to the Chesson Manufacturing Company of Elizabeth City, we told them we had been up against it financially because circumstances had forced us to put in a complete printing plant in Manteo from the jump, or go out of business. Mr. Henry J. Chesson, president, said: "Just let what you owe us ride awhile. We know it is good. Get your plant going first, and then think about paying us."

You can imagine how we feel toward a man of this type. Consider the difference in a wholesale house that had received practically all our trade in their line for three years. They had sold us material at stiff prices, and we had always paid them fairly prompt. When our account ran behind some sixty days, they apparently became panicky over it, got suddenly insistent, and offensively demanded payment. They took the mistake of putting all our eggs in one basket. We should have shared it with other firms just as good.

Business may be cold-blooded, but there are men in it who have fine human instincts that come from the heart. There are others in it far-sighted enough and canny, to simulate a sense of human kindness to foster the prosperity of a good customer. Regardless of motive, such treatment is appreciated by any mere business whose own customers are scions of generations of honest folk whose traditional custom called for yearly settlement. Many a man who reaches the heights, lives to do a good turn for the benefactors of his impoverished youth. Likewise with business; and if we are ever cast in that role, we hope to play it graciously, eagerly and happily.

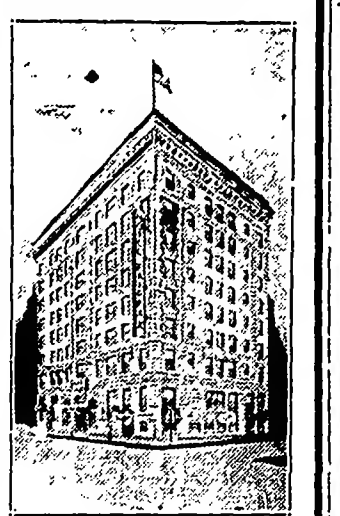
