Come to my Heavenly garden, And see in perfect bloom, The flower you loved so dearly, And thought that I plucked too soon.

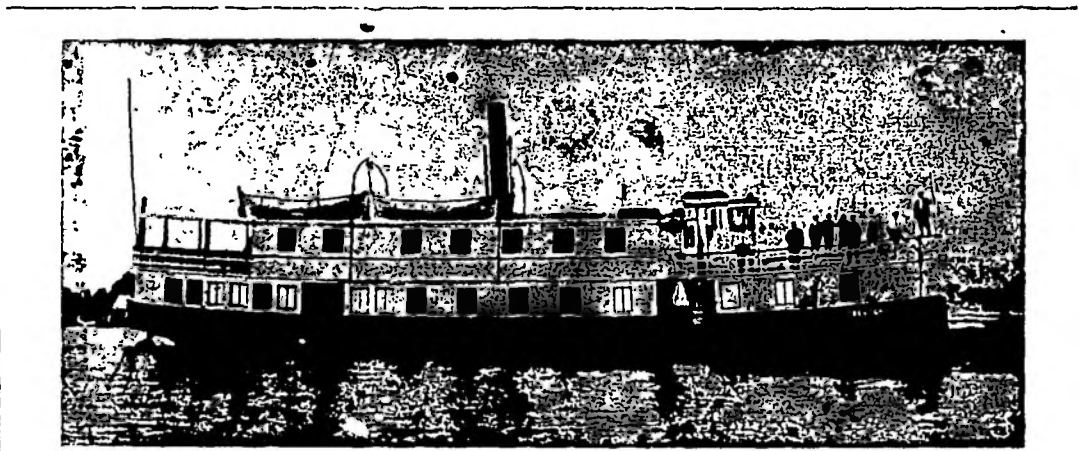
Then you will know my reason, Though you know it not today, Who in his promising manhood I took your loved one away.

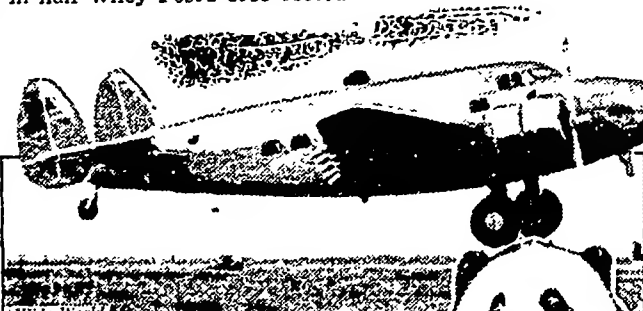
