FISHING AND ALL OUT DOORS

fort-Morehead area on Sunday, due to the southwest half-a-gale which started early in the day. From the cabin of Dave Driskill's Stinson Monoplane as we cruised 1,500 feet above Core Banks, Cape Lookout and Atlantic Beach we could see what few boats were out—many miles away. From our distance aloft the Modow or some large Coast Guard vessel anchored in the Bight of Cape Lookout looked about the same size as the average fishing cruiser. The actual fishing cruisers, we saw the Shearwater and another vessel near the drain as we passed over Fort Macon, looked like small toys upon the water.

It will be good news to trolling anglers to know that Spanish Mackerel, Bonita, Bluefish and other species have all been reported sighted or landed at just about every section of the coast from Southport to Manteo. On an average, more anglers fish for blues and mackerel than any other species along the coast.

Capt. Walt Willis who has been operating the Fishing Information Bureau at the Pennsylvania Station in New York takes a similar job with Atlantic Coast Line in New York. His duties will be to route northern anglers to good fishing grounds—especially fishing grounds which anglers can reach via ACL or connecting lines. During the winter he will be routing anglers on the long-haul to Florida. But, in the summer, he will be sending anglers to the coast and mountains of North Carolina. On his old job, he had to be faithful to the PRR, and most of his roppings were to the Long Island spots. Last year he sent 60,000 anglers to fishing places on Long Island. He has sent a number of anglers to our own coastland. Capt. Willis will do a good service to our fishing communities.

The way things are stacking up now, the fishing on our coast is going to get out of control before another year passes—By that I mean, our present guides and hostels won't be able to take care of the large numbers who will be coming to North Carolina. Wait and see if I am not right.
