

measure of their self-respect. Mr. Cherry is telling his audiences: "Far and beyond any other problem this state faces is the problem of readjustment, from army to civil life, of this group of young men and young women. They are our 'seed corn' and they must

be treated as such." "You can't make a soldier over-night," according to Mr. Cherry. "It takes weeks and months of rigid training. By the same intelligence you can't change a soldier civilian overnight. Living under battle conditions causes mental and physical changes to take place in a man. When these men come home from the war, only syntpathetic handling and treatment will restore them to their full civillan status in a busy and weful
