EDUCATION FOR FARMERS.
 Every young farmer in North Carolina has an opportunity to get the foundation training for his work. The winter courses in agriculture and dairying at the N. C. A. and M. College are practical courses designed entirely for young men and women who can leave the farm only in winter time.

The cost of the whole course is but thirty dollars which includes board, room and books. The lectures and practical work are devoted to stock raising, dairy farming, butter making, milk testing, feeding and breeding farm animals, veterinary medicine, entomology, soil study, stock judging and farm crops.

The value of these courses to a young man or woman who is interested in agriculture cannot be estimated in words. The expense of attending will be paid by increased profits due to better farming, a hundred times.

A circular of information will be sent to anyone asking for the same. Also any information regarding any of the Agricultural courses will be given by addressing the professor of Agriculture, Charles W. Burkett, Raleigh, N. C.
