THE STATE LEGISLATURE

"Between the Prohibitionists and the farmers" says the Charlotte Observer, "the State Legislature is in for a busy time," and sums up the farmers demands briefly as follows:

- The Merchant's Crop lien system repealed.
 - Compulsory school attendance.
 - Vocational Schools.
 - Lower taxation for resident than absentee landlords.
 - State Warehouse system like that of South Carolina.
 - A revamp of the Torrens Title Law.
 - Free school books.
 - Segregation of the races.
 - Initiative and referendum.
- "The efforts," continues The Observer, "in the direction of the improvement of social and educational interests of the rural communities are worthy of the careful consideration of the Legislature, and that this will be accorded we have no doubt. The movement in behalf of vocational education seems surely to be one in the right direction, while there can be no negative debate on the proposition to abolish the crop lien system. At one time such a system served a purpose, but occasion for its further continuance of the statute books has passed."

The Farmers' demands concern the entire State, and we may as well get to thinking about some of the statewide problems of the coming session of the Legislature, for the time has passed for concentration upon local problems—or nearly so.

ORDER
