# Sending Messages

## Claims That She Was Justified by Ameaica's Previous Attitude and That America Did Same Thing.

(By United Press)

Berlin, March 3-Admission was made by Germany today that instructions were sent the German minister at Mexico City regarding the possibilities of Mexico's part in hostilities against the United

The admission was made in semiofficial circles and surprise was expressed at how the American government obtained its information concerning instructions sent secretly by Germany's diplomatic agents. The manner by which the information came into possession of the United States is unknown but the source which admitted the negotiations expressed the belief that apparently the treachery was committed on American soil.

CLAIMS SHE WAS JUSTIFIED Amsterdam, March 3-Admitting her effort to a ign Japan and Mexico with the Kalser's government against the United States. Germany justifies this attempt on ground that she had a right to such precautions in view of the possibilities of war with Amer-A semiofficial source was quoted to this effect in Berlin dispatches today.

Germany decided upon this step after her decision to wage relentless submarine-warfare. claims that she was impeded to such a course by the previous attitude of the American governmen and that subsequent developments justified her course

#### ZIMMERMAN SPEAKS

Berlin, March 3-Foreign Secre-Zimmerman today justified G many's action in seeking to ally Mexico and Japan against the United States.

Such a course, he said, was merely a defensive measure not to be carried out except in case the United States declared war on Germany. Moreover, he said, it could be no more cared a plot than cou'd the report in the South American papers that the United States was seeking to line up the South American remublics in common action against Germany.
