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GERMAN REVOLUTION IN SOUTHERN BRAZIL

Teutons Said to be Well Supplied With Arms and Ammunition are Threatening to Invade Uruguay

By CHARLES STEWART Buenos Aires, April 19.—Brazil's great German population in at least three states has revolted. Dispatches from Montevideo, capital of the Uruguay, the small South American State to the south of Brazil, assert that the Teutons are well armed and have even some artillery. They are said to be plentifully supplied with ammunition and provisions also. It is difficult to get details because Brazil's censorship is strongly suppressing particulars. It seems, however, that the rebellion centers in the Brazilian states of Rio Grande, Parana, and Santa Catharina. The German population there is estimated at half a million. These are Brazil's southern provinces. Uruguay dispatches declare that the Germans attempted to dynamite the railroad bridge at Santa Maria. The Government of the Rio Grande province is attempting to concentrate the strongest loyalist troops to oppose the rebels in Porto Alegre. Meantime Uruguay is massing troops on her border fearing that her territory may be invaded by the Germans. Officials are quoted in Montevideo dispatches who assert their belief in the ability of the government to withstand all such attempts. The Brazilian Germans have been known for some time to be preparing for a move against Uruguay. They would prefer to obtain possession of the rich nitrate deposits of Chile but these are too far away it is believed, to make this practical. Brazilian censorship prevents obtaining verification of what action is being taken to quell the insurrection.

SHOW WONDERS OF ELECTRICITY

STUDENTS OF STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND ENGINEERING GIVE INTERESTING EXHIBIT West Raleigh, N. C., April 19.—The Electrical Engineering Society of North Carolina State College presented to the public for two evenings this week a spectacular show which was of much interest, and of great credit to the students. The apparatus used, much of which was constructed entirely by students, was valued at over \$10,000. Demonstrations and explanations were made of many of the modern, wonderful and mysterious stunts accomplished with electricity. The large attendance was enlightened and entertained by many marvelous accomplishments which electricity now performs. Eggs were fried on ice, an arc lamp was made to talk, write and sing, a telegraph transmitted writing over 30 different parts of the building, iron was heated white hot in a pall of water, an electric magnet was shown capable of lifting a swing containing 3 people, and other interesting features were a mercury vapor lamp, electroplating, lamp burning on glass without wire connections, x-ray, wireless telegraph system, rectifiers and storage batteries, and the instantaneous telephone system. The most spectacular part of the show was a Tesla coil, made by a student which steps up an ordinary 110 volt current to 1,000,000 volts. This coil was shown to produce a three foot spark, and novel experiments, showing beautiful color effects made a great impression. To exhibit the fierceness of the high frequency current produced, two students allowed the current to pass through their bodies and form a spark a foot long between spoons held in their mouths.

FRENCH MAKE FURTHER GAINS

INTENSE ARTILLERY ACTION AROUND ST QUENTIN MAY PRESAGE TREMENDOUS INFANTRY ASSAULT THAT WILL CARRY THE TOWN (By WILBUR FORREST (United Press Staff Correspondent) Paris, April 19.—Everywhere "success" is the epitome of official statements from various fighting fronts of the French offensive today. These statements bring details of a fresh and continuous sweep forward by the French in their great offensive against the German line. Positions dominating Nauroy and Moronvillers were captured in the sweep to the east of Rheims; and in the smashing blows more ground was gained north east of Soissons in the north valley of the Oise. Desperate German attempts to create diversions elsewhere failed today to check the French advance, having no further effect than to bring on a general engagement practically all along the French front. Around St. Quentin General Nivelle reported great artillery activity. This, it is thought, may be the precursor of another tremendous infantry assault in that section which may sweep the town long menaced into the hands of the French. The identification of twelve new German Divisions in one section between Soissons and Auberives means that the Germans there have been compelled to mass 240,000 new troops to take the place of those cut to pieces in the efforts to check the succeeding waves of the French assault. Every dispatch from the front emphasizes the bloody execution wrought by the French artillery against the German favorite method of defense; that is, of massing men at a point of attack. Observers east of Rheims declare that the bloody slaughter of the hall of the French projectiles is appalling and as great as ever seen in any battlefield. Word has been passed to the German front to hold all positions at any cost.
