Thursday night the method of drawing the numbers was changed. General Crowder found that certain State Boards had blundered in preparing their lists and the plan by which the entire process would have been completed in about two hours had to give way to a more elaborate one that necessitated many hours work

This is the plan tollowed:

In each district in the country the men were numbered serially from 1 to the highest number of cards in that district. The numbers drawn established the draft order of every man holding that number in every district. Numbers higher than that number in a certain district were disregarded by that district. For instance Pasquotank's numbers ran only as high as 1,400 and no higher numbers affected this district.
