Betsey's Braves Are Drafted Names and Numbers are Given in Order Drawn at The National Capital

Bulletin boards in the city Friday were crowded about throughout the day in spite of the downpour. The telephone of The Advance office did constant duty answering questions of anxious ones about the draft. Interest in the matter was by no means limited to those of draft age, for the entire city wanted to know who would be called into Uncle Sam's service.

Thursday night the method of drawing the numbers was changed. General Crowder found that certain State Boards had blundered in preparing their lists and the plan by which the entire process would have been completed in about two hours had to give way to a more elaborate one that necessitated many hours work.

This is the plan followed: In each district in the country the men were numbered serially from 1 to the highest number of cards in that district. The numbers drawn established the draft order of every man holding that number in every district. Numbers higher than that number in a certain district were disregarded by that district. For instance Pasquotank's numbers ran only as high as 1,400 and no higher numbers affected this district.

The numbers are given below in the order drawn at Washington and sent to this newspaper by the United Press. They show the order in which the men will appear for examination as well as who are drafted. The numbers apply to every district and will therefore be of interest to all the counties in this section. The names attached, however, are those of Pasquotank's patriots.

FOR AMERICA TO CONSIDER

WISE MAN OF ENGLAND TELLS THIS NATION THROUGH THE UNITED PRESS SOME THINGS ABOUT WAR

London, July 5 (By Mail)—In my judgment the important matters for a nation going into war are these:

First of all, the statesmen and the people should have a true conception of the nature of war and of the character of the particular war they are taking up. Otherwise the leading cannot be right. The supreme leader is always the statesman and in a democratic country the people must understand and sympathize with the statesman. If he sees too far ahead they won't follow and if the popular ideas on the subject of war are not true the greatest leader may be crippled.

In the military sphere the first thing is the choice of a commander and his assistants. When raising an army the vital matter is the choice and education of the officers. In the training of troops all soldiers will say the thing to aim at is discipline and the best means of giving it providing the officers have been well chosen and rightly taught, is to teach the soldiers to shoot and to march.

"The war," said Napoleon, writing to his brother Joseph, "the men are nothing. One man is everything."

At the end of his career Napoleon dictated a pamphlet which he called Notes on the Art of War, the purpose of which was to explain to governments and nations about to go to war how to set about it. He said "the principles of the art of war are those which guided the great captains of the past—Alexander, Hannibal, Caesar, Gustavus, Adolphus, Turenne, Prince Eugene and Frederick the Great." Reviewing the campaigns of these commanders Napoleon pointed out that on all the vital points the practice of all of them was the same. He then reviewed his own campaigns and concluded by saying that "you should make your war as they made it and model yourself upon them," for there is no other way of mastering the secrets of war. In other words "a knowledge of the high parts of war can be obtained only by studying the history of great campaigns and by experience."

In an army that has passed through a long period of peace, experience is necessarily lacking, a knowledge of war is possessed only by those who have studied it in the way Napoleon recommended. Such a student was the late Admiral Mahan of the United States Navy. No writer in any country has shown a stronger grasp of war or better illuminated by his writings its larger aspects, especially in all that concerns maritime warfare.

My first point is Warfare cannot be conducted without knowledge, but in the choice of a commander the most requisite is not knowledge, but character. If I were looking for a commander-in-chief I should search above all for a man of high purpose, who, I could be sure, would think only of his duty, only of his country and never of himself. In war more than in any other of the affairs of life, the saying holds good, "If thine eye be single thy whole body shall be full of light."

I think that Grant as a general and as commander of the armies in the Civil War had the single eye and he has a remarkably strong character Sherman before setting off for Atlanta spent an evening in conversation with an intimate friend, one of his best cavalry generals, reports that late at night they talked a little about Grant. After a pause, Sherman, looking in the fire, said:

"I know a lot more about history and law and war than Grant does, but I'll tell you where he beats me and where he beats the lot of us. He doesn't care a damn for what he can't see the enemy doing and it scares me like hell."

Sherman was a good judge of the kind of character that a commander-in-chief requires. In the second place your commander must have that grasp of affairs and breadth of view which are generally associated with a liberal education and which give to those who know him the impression of a man of larger than the common mold.

Germany Will Not Make Another Peace Offer

Michaelis Declares in Reichstag Speech That His Nation Desires Peace Only as a Victor.

Amsterdam, July 20.—"Germany will not make another peace offer. The peace she desires to conclude is that of a victor and it is the Allies who must hereafter make overtures to end the war," said Michaelis in his maiden speech at the Reichstag yesterday.

"Our aims are, first that the territory of the Fatherland is inviolable and we cannot parley with an enemy demanding parts of the Empire. If we make peace, we must be assured that our frontiers are secure for all time," declared Michaelis.

PEACE RESOLUTION PASSED Copenhagen, July 20.—The German Reichstag yesterday evening passed the peace resolution fostered by the coalition of the Center, Liberal and Socialist party members, according to dispatches received here. The vote was 124 to 116. The resolution declared that Germany did not desire peace with annexation.

VOICES DISSATISFACTION Amsterdam, July 20.—Philip Scheidemann, German Socialist majority leader, voiced his open dissatisfaction at Michaelis' speech, says dispatches from Berlin. Scheidemann opposed the German submarine policy, declaring that it was doing more harm than good.

"Rush recruits here not later than Monday for inspection. Company rapidly filling up." This was the wire that Joseph Peele received from Capt. A. L. Fletcher this morning so those desiring to get in the Supply Company under Capt. Fletcher or the First North Carolina Field Artillery must act not later than next Sunday, July 22nd. Those who apply here and pass the examination by a local physician will leave for Raleigh Sunday. Of course the fares of the recruits will be paid by the government.

Those who enlist in the company will receive thirty-six dollars per month and up. Places are open for men who can keep books, men who can drive or learn to drive an army auto truck, blacksmiths, shoe makers, harness makers and cooks. Men having a trade should make it a point to act today.

Those interested can see Joseph Peele at The Advance Office from 8 a. m. to 10 p. m.

Dr. C. B. Williams will examine the applicants free of charge. The examination for the artillery and the supply company are the same and those passing the examination here are pretty sure to stand the Federal examination at Greenville whether they remain in the supply company or desire a transfer to the artillery.

PROTESTS AGAINST IMMORAL RESORTS

Washington, July 20.—Secretary Daniels today wrote Governor Manning of South Carolina protesting against the immoral resorts surrounding the Charleston Navy Yard and requested Governor Manning to remove this menace to America's young manhood.

TRYING TO WEAR FRANCE OUT

FIGHT WITH GREAT FEROCITY

Paris, July 20.—Germany's assault on the French lines on the Chemin Des Dames reached an unprecedented ferocity today.

Hand to hand fighting interspersed with cannonading of extreme violence is reported.
