## NAVY GETTING ON PEACE BASIS

### Twenty Per Cent of War Personnel Being Discharged And Yachts And Motor Boats Go Back to Owners

(By Associated Press) Washington, Dec. 5.—The discharge of twenty per cent of the navy's war personnel, or about 100,000 men, has been authorized, Secretary Daniels said today. The men will be released as soon as possible, it was stated.

The release of enlisted men, Secretary Daniels said, is not due to the fact that the navy is overmanned for peace needs at present, but in order to allow the return to civil pursuits of youths who joined for the war and don't intend to follow the sea.

Private yachts, motor boats, and other craft taken over by the navy for the war are being returned to their owners.

Secretary Daniels said that by February seven hundred craft will have been stricken from the navy list.

More than a billion dollars has been cut from the Navy's estimates of expenditures for the coming fiscal year, Secretary Daniels disclosed today.

## WILL NOT DEMAND HELIGOLAND BACK

### British Government Has Decided Upon Nationalization Of Railways Says Churchill

(By Associated Press) London, Dec. 4.—The British naval authorities have decided that it will be unnecessary to demand the return of Heligoland to Great Britain by Germany, Winston Spencer Churchill announced in a speech at Dundee tonight.

Churchill also said that the Government had decided upon the nationalization of the railways.

## WALTER JOHNSON HAS PNEUMONIA

Raleigh, Dec. 5.—His many friends throughout the State will be grieved to learn that Rev. Walter N. Johnson, corresponding secretary of the Baptist State Board of Missions, is still quite ill at Rex Hospital in this city, having developed double pneumonia following a case of influenza. His condition is considered serious.

## PLANES GIVEN UP BY PIECEMEAL

(By Associated Press) London, Dec. 4.—There will be no formal surrender of German airplanes at one time as at first expected because it has been found impracticable to assemble two thousand airplanes at one place and because also it is doubtful whether Germany has a sufficient number of reliable aviators to carry out their assembling.

Hence the first surrender of an airplane in history will be carried out piecemeal.

## BIG EARTHQUAKE SHAKES CHILE

## CONLEY CHAPPEL DIES AT NORFOLK

### Injured at Dare Lumber Company Plant Last Saturday Passes Away At Hospital Wednesday Night

Joseph Conley Chappel died Wednesday evening at 5:30 at Sarah Leigh Hospital, following injuries received last Saturday morning at the Dare Lumber Company plant.

Caught in a slowly revolving shafting the boy was hurled over and his head struck a sill with considerable force, seriously injuring the skull.

As soon as the accident occurred he was rushed to the Norfolk hospital by the Dare Lumber Company people on a special train, accompanied by his brother, J. A. Chappel and his sister, Miss Bertha Chappel.

Conley Chappel was the son of Mr. J. C. Chappel of North Road Street. He was eighteen years old and is survived by his father, by three sisters, Mrs. Geo. Creel of Manteo, Mrs. John Whaley and Miss Bertha Chappel of this city; and by two brothers, Clinton Chappel of Dendron, Va., and G. A. Chappel of this city.

He was a member of Blackwell Memorial Baptist Church and the funeral will be conducted by his pastor, Dr. G. W. Clarke at 11 o'clock Friday morning from the home on North Road street.

Interment will be made in Hollywood cemetery.

## REIGN OF TERROR LOOMS IN BERLIN

### Socialists to Inaugurate Carnivals of Blood Friday Say Zurich Reports

(By Associated Press) Paris, Dec. 5.—A terrorist revolution under the leadership of Dr. Liebnicht, radical socialist, will begin in Berlin Friday evening, according to advices received by the Zurich correspondent of the Paris Journal.

Dr. Liebnicht, reports say, has fifteen thousand men well armed at his command.

The population of Berlin, according to the reports, is at the mercy of gangs of marauders and there appears to be no authority there.

## RIOTS IN COLOGNE
