PROHIBITION BY NEXT FEBRUARY

ENTREAT ALLIES OCCUPY BERLIN

Paris, Dec. 18.—Unofficial reports still persist, says Le Matin, that the Ebert-Haase government has entreated the Allies to occupy Berlin.

PHYSICAL TRAINING IS IMPERATIVE

Chicago, Dec. 14.—Fifty per cent of the 25,000,000 boys and girls of school age have physical defects that impede normal development, Williard S. Small, School Hygiene specialist of the Federal Bureau of Education, said in an address today before the American Public Health Association.

After declaring that the nation's need of "physical education" is imperative, the speaker pointed out that 2,500,000 men in the first draft were disqualified for active military service because of physical defects, and added:

"Being unfit for military service, they were therefore unfit to render full service in any capacity. They were unable to get full returns from life in work and happiness."

The physical education needed must assume physical activity as the basic thing, the speaker added. There must be wholesome physical environment, individual physical examination and record, and medical supervision of schools.

"It should provide for all persons between six and eighteen years of age it should extend its benefits to youth above the compulsory school age. It should provide federal aid to permit states to carry on effective systems of physical education. This federal aid should be limited to preparation of teachers for skilled service and payment for skilled service.

"The program proposed will raise the positive coefficient of the physical life of the nation. It will build morality upon the solid foundation of physical soundness and vitality. It will be a powerful influence in Americanization."

HYDROGRAPHIC OFFICE FOR WAR

(By Associated Press)

Washington, Dec. 13.—Reorganization of the Navy's Hydrographic Office during the war so as to make it largely independent of foreign sources of information is shown today in the annual report of Rear Admiral Seaton Schroeder, chief of the office which is maintained to supply marine maps and charts and all sorts of scientific sailing advice to the navy and merchant marine.

"Our entry into the war made it an absolute sine qua non," Admiral Schroeder said, "and although the final result cannot be immediately achieved of covering the more remote untraveled seas with our charts the office has been reformed brought to a position of virtual independence and self-support. And that position will of necessity be maintained from now on."

Owing to the war, the only surveys now being carried on are around Guam, in the Gulf of Fonseca and near Guantanamo. Submarine operations, the report said, have added slightly to the sum total of hydrographic information.

TO CONFER WITH KING IMMANEUL

President Wilson Feels Warmest Sympathy for Italy's Part in the War. Much interest in Conference.

(By Associated Press)

Paris, Dec. 18.—Much interest attaches to the conference which President Wilson will have with King Victor Immanuel who is expected here tomorrow.

It has been said by the President's associates that he will go further into the subject of Italy's position at the Peace Conference in his conversation with the King.

It is known that the President feels the warmest sympathy for the purposes which led Italy to enter the war.

CONFERS WITH FOCH

Paris, Dec. 18.—President Wilson and Marshall Foch talked for half an hour last night, mainly in reference to the armistice between the Allies and Germany.

PEACE IN JUNE

Marcel Hutin of the Echo de Paris states that most probably the peace treaty will be signed at Versailles some time about the beginning of June and Foch will lead the Allied armies under the Arch of Triumph in Paris within fifteen days after peace is declared.

PARIS PAPERS PLACE DATE

This morning's newspapers variously place the probable date of the opening of the Peace Conference at from January 10th to 15th.

Meetings preliminary to the Conference will be held at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs with Premier Clemenceau presiding. Prior to this important conferences will take place, including one which President Wilson will have with Lloyd George.

KARLSBAD ASKS FAVOR

Copenhagen, Dec. 18.—Vienna dispatches to the Cologne Gazette report that the town council of Karlsbad has asked President Wilson to recognize Karlsbad as an independent republic under American supremacy.

DOCUMENTS SHOW PLANS OF MURDER

(By Associated Press)

London, Dec. 18.—Documents found on one of those arrested in connection with the assassination of President Paes Saturday show that an extensive plot had been originated. Participants in it were drawing lots to see who should strike the blow against the president.

POLISH GOVT. WITH ENTENTE

Copenhagen, Dec. 18.—The Polish government has declared itself ready to conclude military and political alliance with the Entente nations, according to the Cologne Gazette.
