## NO SOLUTION YET OF FIUME PROBLEM

### But Controversy As To Other Italian Claims Seem Tending Toward Adjustment

(By Associated Press)

Paris, May 14.—Italian delegates to the Peace Conference no longer are insisting upon the fulfillment of the secret treaty of London and that part of the controversy relative to the territory on the eastern shore of the Adriatic is tending toward adjustment, according to those who have taken part in the recent conferences.

The status of Fiume is still being discussed as the plan to make it a free city similar to Danzig has not proved acceptable.

## CONSIDER AUSTRIAN TREATY

The Council of Four met this morning, considering problems relative to ports and waterways and some details of the Austrian treaty.

## RECEIVED GERMAN NOTES

It is presumed that the German note, delivered yesterday, was also taken up.

Three notes from the German delegation were delivered to the Council this morning.

## APPOINT SUBCOMMITTEES

The Council of Four today appointed sub-committees, comprising one member from each of the five great powers to deal with the objections and proposals from the German plenipotentiaries.

## BRITISH RENEW EFFORTS

Renewed efforts are being made by the British delegation to secure an agreement calling for the pooling of the former German merchant vessels and their distribution on a basis of tonnage loss during the war instead of the plan of the United States for retaining those ships interned in America prior to that country's entering the war.

## BY END OF WEEK

The belief that the treaty with Austria will be handed the Austrian delegates by the end of the week was expressed today.

It develops that the Allied powers to be represented in the negotiations with Austria will be less numerous than those at Versailles. Those powers will comprise the states which declared war or broke diplomatic relations with Austria-Hungary.

## POLAN DPRESENTS CLAIM

Poland is laying claim to some of the warships surrendered by Germany. She presented her claims to the Council of Foreign Ministers this afternoon.

## ECONOMIC SITUATION

Three of the German notes delivered to the Council of Four, says the Havas agency, deal with the following:

The effect of the peace terms upon Germany's economic situation.

The manner in which President Wilson's points are applied which is protested, that it is declared that Germany is prepared to subscribe to them.

## NAVY DIRIGIBLE LEAVES MONTAUK

### NC-4 Makes For Trepassey Bay, But Weather Still holds Up Start To Azores Across Atlantic

(By Associated Press)

Montauk Point, N. Y., May 14.—Navy dirigible C-5 left today on its flight to St. Johns, Newfoundland, which may be followed, if the coastal performance proves satisfactory, by an attempt to fly across the Atlantic.

## NC-4 IN FLIGHT

Chatham, Mass., May 14.—Naval seaplane NC-4 left here this morning for Trepassey Bay, Newfoundland, the starting point of the trans-Atlantic flight. NC-4 today was to fly to Halifax but if her motors worked well might continue the flight tonight to Trepassey.

## READY TO LEAVE

St. Johns, May 14.—American aviation officers here in connection with the possible trans-Atlantic flight of the navy dirigible C-5 stated today that the American seaplane flyers are prepared to leave Trepassey at six o'clock this afternoon unless unfavorable weather developed.

## MAKING GOOD SPEED

Boston, May 14.—NC-4 is reported by wireless that she is off the Maine coast before noon. The message said that the machine was making 85 miles an hour.

## STOP AT HALIFAX

Washington, May 14.—Lieut. Commander Read plans to stop the NC-4 at Halifax only a few minutes during the flight to Newfoundland. He so advised the cruiser Baltimore at Halifax by wireless which was intercepted and relayed to the Navy department this afternoon.

## WEATHER UNSATISFACTORY

While weather conditions along the route from Trepassey Bay to the Azores improved today, experts say they are still unsatisfactory for the start of the seaplanes on their trans-Atlantic flight, according to dispatches received here.

## GOES TO SAVANNAH

He is making the trip with his cousin, Capt. W. T. Willis of Southport. Capt. Willis was passing thru here from Washington, D. C., where he took eight surf boats for exhibition during the Victory Loan drive and is on his way down the coast as far as Texas to distribute life saving boats to the stations. The route follows the inland waters as far as Wilmington, then goes out to sea.

Better Welfare Week is being observed thruout the county under the direction of Miss Marcella Albertson, Home Demonstrator. The campaign will continue into next week until it has reached every part of the county.

Miss Albertson is being assisted in the work by Mrs. J. G. Fearing, Safety League worker, and by Mrs. V. C. Gilmore.

On Monday afternoon Mrs. Gilmore and Miss Albertson met with the Newbegun Woman's Club and held a Better Babies meeting.

On Tuesday morning Miss Albertson met with the Body Road Woman's Club.

On Wednesday morning Mrs. Fearing and Mrs. Gilmore went with Miss Albertson to the meeting of the Berea Woman's Club; on Friday they met with the Newland Club.

At each meeting the care of babies, the prevention of sickness, proper feeding, pure water, and other essentials are stressed. Literature is given out. It is urged that each baby be weighed and measured, and if the baby does not come up to the standard for Better Babies, that he be taken to a physician at once for examination, in order to prevent future ills.

## CITY GETS NEW ADMINISTRATION

### Parks And Cohoon Only Members of Old Board Re-elected In Warm Contest Tuesday

Elizabeth City's next Board of Aldermen will be G. F. Derrickson, J. R. Bowden, J. B. Leigh, C. M. Cooper, P. C. Cohoon, W. A. Worth, Bascon Sawyer and H. G. Parks.

P. C. Cohoon and H. G. Parks are the only members of the present Board who were re-elected.

Mathias Owens and J. B. Ferebee candidates from the first ward and members of the retiring Board, were overwhelmingly defeated by Bowden and Derrickson.

With eight candidates in the Second Ward Leigh and Cooper polled a large plurality, Leigh receiving 149 votes and Cooper 118. C. W. Stevens came next with 76.

In the Third Ward Cohoon and Ward were re-elected without opposition.

Sawyer led the ticket in the Fourth Ward. The other two candidates in this ward were Parks and Greenleaf, the former receiving 106 votes and the latter 62.

The election was an overwhelming defeat for the present city administration and a general shake-up in the personnel of the city officials, all of whom, including the Mayor, are elected by the Board of Aldermen, is indicated.
