**DANIELS VETOES A BRYAN BILL**

**MR. HUNTINGTON'S RETIREMENT**

His successor, a young man of energy and talents and application, will find it much easier to take the work where Mr. Huntington has left it off and build it up in terms of exacting future needs than Mr. Huntington found the field 20 years ago, when it was a new venture, more or less criticized in the circles with which he was identified.—Charlotte News.
