

NO BLUE MONDAY AT FIRST BAPTIST

Record Breaking Crowd For Day Service Hears Dr. Jester Preach Monday Afternoon.

Monday is usually a day off day in conducting an evangelistic meeting. Ordinarily pastors and evangelists do not have any day meeting on Monday. But it was the exception with reference to the meeting now in progress in the First Baptist Church. On Monday afternoon at three-thirty there filled into the church auditorium the largest day attendance thus far since the meeting began. The house was considerably more than half filled.

Dr. Jester's theme Monday afternoon was, "Kadesh-barnea." The colossal blunder made by the children of Israel as they came to the border of the Promised Land, refusing under God to go over and possess the land, was vividly portrayed by the minister. For their sin they were made to wander forty years in the Wilderness, and none of that generation—except Joshua and Caleb—was permitted to enter the land God had promised.

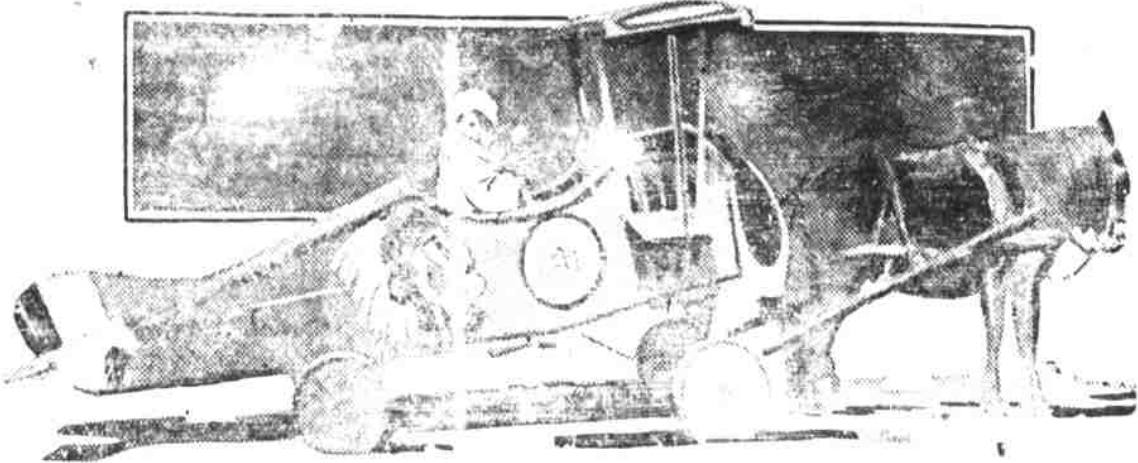
The minister said, "Every individual has his or her Kadesh-barnea sometime or other in their life. There are those who perchance have yielded to Jesus Christ and they have been saved but their life has never been given to God. 'It took only a few hours to get the children of Israel out of Egypt,' said Dr. Jester, 'but it took a long time for God to get Egypt out of the children of Israel.' We are saved in a moment's time, when we trust in Jesus Christ as our Saviour, but all too many are never completely won from and rid of it in their work lives."

The sermon made a profound impression, and almost all those who are Christians and were present, rose to their feet in praise to the Father, in response to the evangelist's request that they wish to be more fully consecrated and devoted to Jesus Christ.

The night service was exceptional fine for a Monday night. The house was filled with anxious souls and attentive listeners. Dr. Jester preached on the question, "What shall I do with Jesus?" There is no evading this question," said the evangelist, "Christ is on your hands and you can not shift the issue or shirk the responsibility of answering this question. Some of you are going to settle it tonight. You may be the victim of that subtle, insidious and claim not to believe in the Bible as the inspired word of God; you may claim not to believe in a hell, and you may persuade yourself that you are not lost; but know this, O man! that the entrance of a denial does not alter a fact. If I did not believe with all the being of my soul that men are lost on account of sin and are eternally doomed unless they accept Jesus Christ and believe on Him as their personal Saviour, I would not be here nor would be preaching the gospel. That is the reason why we are here holding this meeting, that men may come to Christ and be saved."

"A man," said the minister, "may believe in the Deity of Christ, and believe that Christ was a good man and believe that he died to save sinners, and a man may believe that he himself is a sinner, and he may believe that the Bible is true, and still be lost." A historical belief in Christ will not suffice. I went to Mount Vernon and saw evidence that George Washington lived, and was the first President of the United States. I believed it before I went there. There was a historical belief in the personality of Jesus Christ and then believe, 'You must come for your self and believe in Him as your personal Saviour.' 'Christ is on your hands now. You will be on His hands some day. Christ stood before Pilate but Pilate is going to stand before Christ.' There is no escaping the question. Pilate sought to do so but failed. He sent Him to Herod but they brought Him back to Pilate. Pilate sought to have them release Jesus and crucify Barabba. He washed his hands identifying his innocency in the crucifixion of Christ but his guilt did not go

Memory Of Okisko Hero Honored at Monday Night's Legion Meeting

The local post of the American Legion is to be known as the "Seth W. Perry Post" in honor of the only member of Pasquotank County who lost his life in actual fighting during the war. This was decided on Monday night by members of the local post of the American Legion in a meeting called for Monday evening. The aged mother will be written a check of ten dollars by officers of the local post advising her of the action taken by this organization and of the deep appreciation felt for the supreme sacrifice made by her son.

About twenty-five ex-service men were present at the meeting Monday night and the election of officers and the general discussion brought on more excitement than one would expect. The question of the bonus for ex-service men brought on quite a live debate for a few minutes. Motions were made that resolutions be adopted for and against the bonus. The motion that no action be taken in the matter because of the large number of service men in the county who were not present, however, was carried. Those opposed to the bonus seemed to be in the majority—at least they were most heard from last night. Their contention was that the financial condition of the country did not justify allowing a bonus to service men and that every soldier who was not disabled during the war was well able to take care of himself.

Stress was laid on this point that the men entering the army and navy went in for service they believed to be right and that they did not want any additional bonus. Those favoring the bonus argued that the standpoint of service men during the war was that they would not be paid until the war was over and they considered those who were not in the service favored the bonus.

OFFICERS ELECTED

The election of a chaplain was postponed until the next meeting in that no member who had been in service was present.
