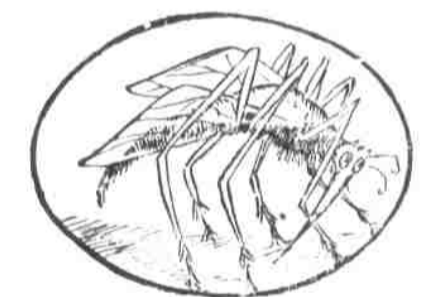
The teachers who attend will be taught how to secure the libraries and how to use them to the best advantage. The State will lend the traveling libraries to any club or school for three months or longer, if desired.
