OFFICIAL RETURNS IN PASQUOTANK

How Various Precincts of County And Wards of City Voted In Second Primary on July Third

Camden, March 8's majority in Pasquotank in the second primary of July 3, according to official returns was 141. The Charlotte men ran well above the forecasts of his friends, based on early and incomplete returns, carrying every ward in this city and losing in only three rural precincts, in two of which the vote was negligible. Salem went unanimously for Gardner 26 to 0. At Newton the vote was for Gardner 11 to 8. At Waverly school house it was 2 to 6 for Gardner. All other precincts went overwhelmingly for Morrison.
