SOUNDS KEYNOTE COMMITTEE OF 48

Allen McCurdy, Temporary Chairman, At Opening of Convention Today Denounces Democrats and Republicans

Chicago, July 10.—Delegates summoned to Chicago by the Committee of Forty Eight and the single tax representatives met to-day in the preliminaries of an attempt to nominate a fusion Third Party Presidential candidate who would run on a platform satisfactory to both elements.

The first work was the election of a committee on platform and procedure

Allen McCurdy, secretary of the Committee of Forty Eight, was selected as temporary chairman.

Chicago, July 10.—The Republican and Democratic parties were denounced as the "right and left wing of the same bird of prey" at the opening of the proposed "Third Party" national convention here today.

Sounding the keynote of the assemblage called together by the committee of 48 to adopt a platform and place in the field another set of candidates for presidency and vice-presidency, Allen McCurdy, temporary chairman charged that the two big parties had evaded paramount domestic issues at a time when what the country needs is "fewer laws and more freedom."

The abolition of special privileges, Mr. McCurdy said, was the issue around which the new party would appeal to the voters. In November, he said, the party purposed effecting that end through removing the sources from which privilege derives its power.

"To accomplish this purpose," he declared, "it proposes public ownership of transportation and of the principal land resources of the country and declares that all land held out of use for speculation should be freed into use for taxation."

"Consider the actual conditions under which we meet. After years of secret slavery the Republican party and the Democratic party come into the open and reveal themselves to themselves and to the nation as nothing but the right wing and the left wing of the same bird of prey. It is no longer possible for any one even to pretend that there is any difference on any issue between them. There is not a war in either of their platforms that might not have been written and unanimously endorsed by a convention exclusively composed of corporation lawyers and Wall Street bankers.

"The Republican bid is bold. It reads out of its councils every man and woman who ever stood for any human rights; adopts a platform that evades, equivocates or straddles every living issue; paves the way for a war by which, in exchange for the lives and treasure of the people, Mexican oil shall be delivered to the interests; and consistently crowns its work by nominating for the Presidency a proven steady, wheel-horse politician, guaranteed to stand without hitching. Thus stands the party of Abraham Lincoln in the last days of its decadent faithlessness, naked and unshamed in its servile service of a greedy plutocracy."

KENYON ASKS REPEAL OF APPROPRIATION

C. R. Pugh Back From Middle West Admits Democratic Rule Not Ruined Old North State

Back from a 3,200 mile automobile trip C. R. Pugh says that the more he sees of the U. S. A. the better he likes North Carolina. "North Carolina looks good even to a Republican, especially to a Republican who has just crossed Tennessee," he declares.

Leaving here Mr. and Mrs. Pugh and Mr. and Mrs. Warren Pliner motored to Chicago, attending the Republican National Convention. From Chicago they went to St. Louis, from St. Louis to Newport, Arkansas, from Newport to Memphis and from Memphis by way of Nashville and Knoxville to Asheville. They were accompanied home by Mrs. Pugh's niece, Miss Darline Bulphitt, of Illinois.

At Newport Mrs. Pugh and Mrs. Pliner were judges in a Fourth of July celebration contest.

"North Carolina roads compare more than favorably with those of any state through which we passed," says Mr. Pugh "except those of Pennsylvania, Maryland and Ohio. We found the going good all the way except in Tennessee."

As an agricultural state Mr. Pugh says that North Carolina is unsurpassed though the agricultural resources of some of the middle western states, notably Ohio, have been more fully developed than those of North Carolina.

PEKING MUSTNT BE BOMBARDED

Diplomatic Corps Issues Warning To Government — Tuan Chi Jui's Forces Surrounding City Now

Peking, July 10.—Warning was given the government by the diplomatic corps here today that in the case of an uprising there must be no fighting in this city and Peking must not be bombarded.

The forces commanded by Tuan Chi Jui are surrounding Peking. Jui's attitude is the result of the government's dismissal of the Inner Mongolian commissioner.

Washington, July 10.—American forces in Peking consist of legation guards and 275 marines.

The only American army detachment in China is the Fifteenth Infantry at Tientsin, eighty miles from Peking.

Several other powers also have legations there.
