All reductions are effective July 1 and constitute a greater cut than was generally expected. On a short earn five and three-quarters per cent on the value of their property rather than approximately six per cent, fixed as a reasonable return in the transportation act of 1920.

Passenger and pullman rates are unaffected. Agricultural products are not affected by the reduction, the voluntary cut made by the railroads on January 1st substituting for the decision on these commodities.

The commission defined the percentages of reduction in the southern district as twelve and one-half per cent instead of the twenty-five per cent authorized in 1920. The commission expressed the conclusion that "assumption that railroad rates can or should be stabilized on the present high basis is futile."
