Urges Safety First Farming 'CITY OWES DEBT' TO THE FARMER For Farmers In Pasquotank

County Farm Agent Falls Thinks Farmers in This County Should Begin Now to Adapt Their Methods to Boll Weevil Conditions and Will Not Only Tell But Also Show Them How to Do This During Coming Crop Year.

County Farm Agent G. W. Falls is mapping out his work for 1923, and, regardless of whether Repre-sentative Cohoon's act creating a Pasquotank Commission of Agricul-ture is passed or not. Mr. Falls is anxious to make this year's work his best in the County.

There will be demonstrations in every township in the County of the various crops grown here, and particular stress is to be laid on permanent pasture. Some of the crops in which there will be demonstrations accessible to every part of the County are corn, cotton, Irish pota-


toes, soy beans and cover crops. As to cotton, Mr. Falls looks for an increased acreage seems prisoned miners. crop. probable this year. 


