Gas on Rails

The Advance has noted with considerable interest the following item under a High Point date line in a recent issue of the News and Observer:

The Southern Railway Company will inaugurate gasoline propelled trains on the short line between High Point and Ashboro, about November 1, and the same service between Salisbury and Norwood about the same date, according to a statement of an official of the company here today.

A combination motor, baggage car and passenger seating capacity of 20 and a trailer car with passenger capacity of 20 will comprise the equipment of the trains. It was stated likewise that the company contemplates the employment of this new service on all similar short lines ultimately.

This newspaper has had a conviction for some time that the railroads would be forced to some step to meet motor bus competition for short haul traffic with the development of paved highways throughout North Carolina.

If the experiment of the Southern is a success The Advance wonders if it would be too much to hope that some of us here in Elizabeth City may see the day when smokeless and relatively noiseless trains, with open cars for summer which would afford one as good view of the country through which he was passing as an automobile, will be operating on frequent and regular schedules both between Elizabeth City and Norfolk and between Elizabeth City and Suffolk. It sounds too good to be true. But unless something of the sort does come to pass before concrete roads connect Elizabeth City with both Norfolk and Suffolk, it looks as though the motor bus would put the Norfolk Southern out of business so far as interurban passenger traffic is concerned.

An Untenable Position

In the opinion of this newspaper, most respectfully submitted, Trial Justice Spence put himself in a position that he will not find tenable when he undertook in recorder's court Monday morning to set himself up as arbiter of the question of when cattle quarantined under the Statewide cattle-tick eradication law may be released from such quarantine.

Until he put himself in this position Judge Spence did not have to trouble himself at all with the question of whether it was the proper time to lift the quarantine on certain premises or not. That was a matter under the law left with the State authorities and Judge Spence's sole duty was to determine whether the law requiring the owner of quarantined cattle to

did regularly any cattle on his premises had been complied with—a comparatively simple matter.

But when Judge Spence sets himself up to determine whether the cattle tick has been eradicated on certain premises or not he is not only taking an authority not vested in him by law and as to which he will hardly claim that he can qualify as an expert, but he is also opening up the way for every cattle owner haled into court for failure to dip his cattle to set up the contention that his herd and his premises are free of ticks.

And if no cattle are dipped in Pasquotank except from premises on which the ticks can be actually found at the time of the dipping, the complete eradication of the cattle-tick in Pasquotank will be indefinitely deferred.
