



The alert business man dealing with present day conditions knows that the big word today is "Turn-Whether he be a merchant, manufacturer, over." jobber, or banker, he sees that one thing with a clear vision unbiased by the limits of his own business. It is in the air, and on the tip of every tongue.

The proof of this is in the fact that right now, under these very conditions, the manufacturers who are putting proper emphasis on creating a demand for their product, as well as selling it, are doing a big business and are actually getting the high turnover that others are tuying so strenuously to get through intensive selling.

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
