The question before him is whether he shall accept the lucrative offer made to him by a New York firm or enter the government service as Attorney general at a moment when the eyes of the country are fixed upon the President in his task of naming a successor to Harry M. Daugherty. Those who are urging Dean Stone to accept insist that he gill not lose by serving the Government at. this juncture and that as a private lawyer his reputation would be considerably enhanced if he entered the Cabinet now. What Dean Stone's decision will be is at the moment unknown but he represents the type of man Mr. Coolidge wants—a man whom he personally trusts and at the same time stands before the country as one of its ablest lawyers.
