EX-LIEUT. GOVERNOR OF VIRGINIA IS DEAD

New York, April 5.—Joseph Edward Willard, former United States Ambassador to Spain, died at his home here last night of agonia pectoris.

Mr. Willard was born in Washington in 1865 and was a graduate of Virginia Military Institute. He studied law at the University of Virginia and served in the Virginia house of delegates and was for four years lieutenant governor of that state.

Pillsbury Abandons Two Minneapolis Flour Mills

Minneapolis, April 5.—(Special.)—The closing of two Pillsbury flour mills here is attributed to unfavorable freight rates. The abandoned plants had a capacity of 4,750 barrels a day. The men employed have been absorbed in local mills and those at Buffalo, where the Pillsbury Company has located plants to overcome freight rate advantage in certain territory.
