F. M. Rodgers returned Wednesday from a business trip to New Bern.

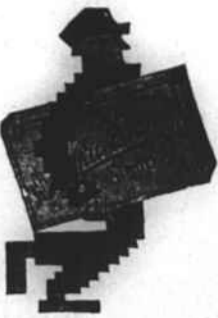
CHAPPELL-CHESSON
