SPINNING ACTIVITY DECLINES HEAVILY

Washington, May 21.—Cotton spinning during April was less active than during March and showed a heavy decline from April a year ago. The Census Bureau's monthly spinning activity report shows that active spindle hours for April numbered 6,769,711,331 and spindles in place April 30 number 37,745,967.

PEA MOVEMENT NEAR ITS PEAK

Movement Tuesday Was 12 Cars With Prospects of Even Bigger Shipments for Remainder of This Week.

May pea pickers, commission men, car loaders and scores of other individuals are in a state of feverish activity as the routing of May peas out of Elizabeth City advanced to 12 car loads Tuesday with indications of even greater shipments for the balance of the week.

On Saturday there were six cars outward bound, handled by N. Howard Smith, Spence-Hollowell, R. C. Abbott, Brock & Scott and two by W. A. Brock. On Saturday Worth & Parkerson shipped a carload of cabbage.

Eight cars moved on Monday. The shippers were R. C. Abbott, three; W. A. Brock, two; Brock & Scott, two; and Spence-Hollowell, one. W. A. Brock shipped to Boston and Brock & Scott to Chicago. The majority of the cars are moving to New York.

On Tuesday the largest number of cars since the beginning of the season went out on the early train. They were shipped by: R. C. Abbott, three; Brock & Scott, two; Spence-Hollowell, two; Jeannette, one; N. Howard Smith, one; Produce & Ginning Company, one; and W. A. Brock, two. Spence-Hollowell was the only shipper to Chicago. All others went to New York.

There were 10 or 12 other cars in addition to the 12 actually shipped which were being loaded Tuesday afternoon and were to be shipped early Wednesday morning.

The roads leading into Elizabeth City are crowded with wagons, carts, automobiles and trucks loaded with empty baskets on the outward trips and with May peas on the return to town. The freight yards in the vicinity of the commission warehouses are filled with cars and tons of ice are being placed in the cars.

The price of May peas continues low. The value dropped a little early in the week recovering on Tuesday to about its former level at \$2.50 a basket. Hope is still felt that better prices will prevail late this week.

NEGRO FOUND DEAD AT STEERING WHEEL

Charley Nichols, negro, of Coinjock, was found dead Tuesday in the automobile which he had been driving and which he had apparently driven into the embankment alongside the road near the Methodist Church about two miles from Coinjock, according to reports received here over long distance telephone from Currituck Courthouse Wednesday afternoon.

It is not known whether the negro's steering gear broke and he was killed by the impact of the steering wheel in his breast when the car got from under control and smashed into the bank, or whether he suffered a fatal heart attack at the wheel and the car ran off the road as a result.

Nichols is reported to have been found with no visible bruises on his body dead at his wheel about 20 minutes after the accident.
