Peterson Wins Favor

O. J. Peterson, candidate for Commissioner of Labor and Printing, seems to be gaining in strength rapidly, especially among the voters of the East. Here is the Monroe Journal's view of his candidacy: We did not bring Peterson out for this office and he is not, therefore, particularly our candidate, but we are bound to vote for him for a very simple reason. That reason is that there is no better man in North Carolina, or anywhere else for that matter, or one better fitted for the office. We have known Pete a long time and know that there is not a single element of true manhood that does not find expression in him. He is a man of intellect and conscience. But if the men and women of this county are looking for a real man to cast their ballots for, they need not go any further, for Peterson is a man, brave as a lion, sweet as a woman, and he would not do a mean thing to be President of the United States, much less Commissioner of Labor and Printing.

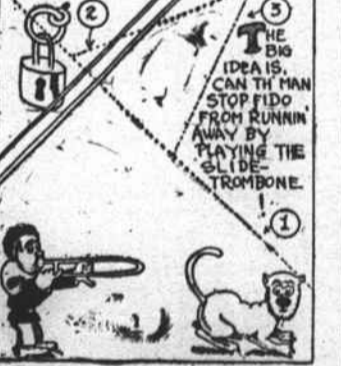

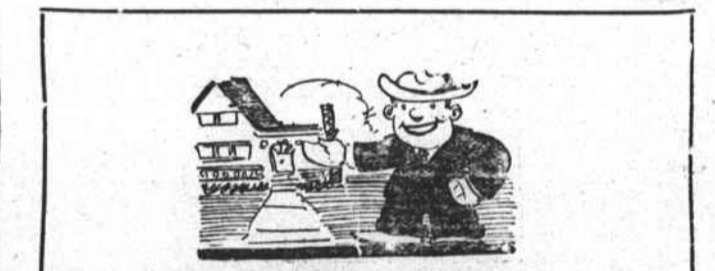
