As to the Question of Law

Some question having arisen, since J. Walton Hobbs, candidate for sheriff, came out on a platform of law enforcement, as to whether it is the duty of the sheriff to aid in the locating of illicit distilleries in his County and bringing the operators of such distilleries to justice, The Advance thinks it not amiss to cite Section 21 of Chapter 1 of the Public Laws and Resolutions passed by the General Assembly at its 1923 session:

It is the duty of the sheriff of each county in the State and of the police of each incorporated town or city in the State to search for and seize any stills or apparatus used for the manufacture of intoxicating liquor in violation of the laws of North Carolina, and to deliver same, with any materials used for making such liquor found on the premises, to the board of county commissioners, who shall confiscate the same and shall cause the distillery to be cut up and destroyed, in their presence or in the presence of a committee of the board and who may dispose of the material, including the copper or other material from the destroyed still or apparatus, in such manner as they may deem proper.

GOOD SEASON FOR STUMPY POINTERS

Shipped More Fish This Season Than Any Other Point in Dare With Wanchese Second and Manteo Third.

Manteo, May 28.—Two hundred thousand dollars is a rough estimate of the value of the fish passing through Dare County during the season which has practically closed there.

More fish have been shipped from Stumpy Point than from any other place in the county, the gross value of fish being shipped from this point being estimated at \$90,000. Wanchese probably comes second in the shipping points of Dare County, shipping something like \$60,000 worth of fish from that place. Manteo is another leading shipping point and it is estimated that around \$50,000 in fish have passed through here.

Figuring on a conservative basis of a profit of thirty-three and one third per cent on fish this season the fisherman of Dare have cleared over \$65,000 dollars in fish during the last three months. The price for fish this season is about normal, it is said, the price averaging something like 25c a pound.
